### HONEY MAID RECIPES

Graham Cheese Muffins

1 1/2 cups sugar.  
1/4 tsp. salt.  
1 1/2 cups butter, melted.  
1/2 cup milk.  
1 egg.  
3 ozs. soft package cheese (put through sieve).  
2 tps. baking powder.  
Crumble crackers, add sugar, salt and melted butter. Heat milk and pour over cracker mixture. Add beaten egg, strained cheese and baking powder. Bake in greased muffin pans in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) 20-25 minutes. 12 small muffins.

Graham Cream Layer Cake  
1 cup sugar.  
3 egg whites.  
1/4 tsp. salt.  
28 Honey Maid graham crackers.  
1/2 tps. baking powder.  
1 tsp. vanilla.  
1/2 cup shortening.  
1/2 cup milk.  
3 egg whites.

Cream sugar and butter together. Add beaten egg yolks, milk and salt and beat well. Crumble crackers very fine and mix with baking powder and add to sugar-butter mixture. Add vanilla and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into two greased layer cake tins and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 20-25 minutes. Fill and top with whipped sweetened and vanilla flavored cream and sprinkle with chopped candied ginger. Makes a nine inch cake.
