Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "The Way, O God, is in the sanctuary: who is so great a God as our God?" (Ps. 77:13). The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Divine Mind is the only cause or Principle of existence. Cause does not exist in matter, in mortal mind, or in physical forms. . . . Belief in a material basis, from which may be deduced all rationality, is slowly yielding to the idea of a metaphysical basis, looking away from matter to Mind as the cause of every effect" (pp. 262, 268).

Yet knows they'll ask for more.

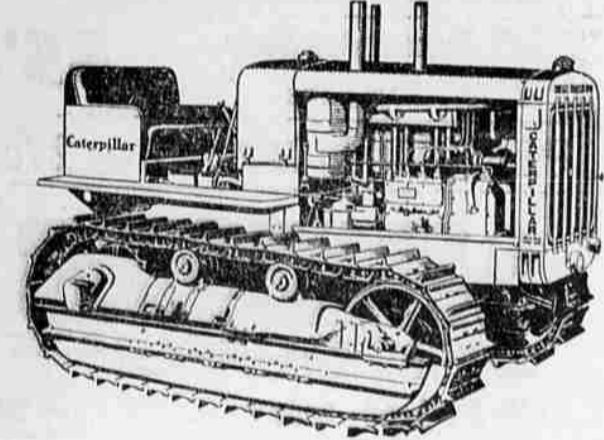
And he is the proof that courage alone
