Rumors of a plan for breaking the Pacific coast maritime workers' strike, now in its second month, were again heard as Federal mediator Henry F. Grady flew to Washington to report a deadlock in peace negotiations. Police lines have increased their vigilance in Los Angeles following a waterfront battle in which five were injured. In Seattle Sheriff Claude G. Bannish disclosed that 500 extra deputies were ready for immediate duty.  
Gunfire and bombings which caused the injury of one person and endangered many others continued over the weekend in the strike ridden Alabama mine fields.

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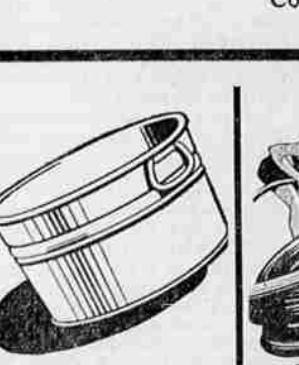

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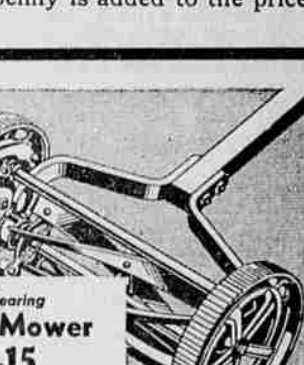
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
