The Americans were big and powerful. There were bound to be some spills. The authorities wisely decided to keep empty bottles out of reach."

DROUGHT VICTIMS TO GET NEW LANDS

Federal Relief Planned For 5,000 Families In South Dakota

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Five thousand South Dakota farm families, victims of the searing drought, are to be moved to better land within the state as one of the government's major steps toward meeting the gigantic relief problem brought by lack of rain in the midwest.

The state government will cooperate in furnishing new farms by making available land it has taken for non-payment of taxes. Each family is to be given enough land to provide a living.

The federal government will participate by buying the farms to be abandoned as part of its sub-marginal land-reclamation program. It will also assist in buying the new farms by offering easy payment loans through the farm credit administration; by additional loans for stock, feed and planting; and by offering assistance in management.

Water Spreading In Sandhills In Spite of Drouth

ELLSWORTH, Neb. (AP)—There's water in those sandhills. While other parts of Nebraska are baking with drought, ranchers in the western ranges of the sandhills complain at times that they have too much water.

The water table has risen in this region for years, they insist, as contrasted with eastern Nebraska sandhill districts where it has fallen and resulted in the drying of lakes.

At the Sandox ranch northeast of here, for instance, a five-inch rain not long ago made one lake where two had stood before. The bottom of the pocket valley there has not been dry in years although it was dry enough when Jules Sandox, the late fruit grower, called the "Burbank of the Sandhills," moved there in 1912.

Since then the water has encroached gradually on the orchards which Sandox set out. Each year more trees are planted on the higher slopes to take the place of those water-killed before.

A tract of prized Turkestan alfalfa, imported from Russia more than 20 years ago by Sandox and never exceeded, was drowned out by the rise of the lake.

Every building on the Sandox ranch, with the exception of the house, has been moved from time to time because of rising water, and from a bedroom window it is possible on occasion to shoot ducks.

The pocket valleys in which the sandhill lakes develop have a layer of hardpan beneath the sand. One farmer tried to drain away the water on his land by boring through the hardpan with a post auger. The water went through the hardpan all right, but in the wrong direction. The pond spread out instead of draining away, and he had to move his buildings.

IOWA CITY, Ia. (AP)—Summer vacations has rolled around again for University of Iowa students, but it'll be almost a month before many of the school's star athletes can partake of any of its joys.

Black Widow Bite Kills Mississippi Girl

WINONA, Miss., June 12 (AP)—The bite of a black spider is blamed for the death of the 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Jennings of Valden, Miss.

The child was bitten on an eyelid and brought to a hospital where she died.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 12 (AP)—The death of William Russell was attributed today to the bite of a "black widow" spider.

Russell, foreman of a mill at Baur, Utah, died in a hospital here last week of what was then believed to be blood poisoning.

A postmortem examination and discovery of the spiders in Russell's home later led to the conclusion that the insect bite had caused his death.

GEORGE CAN DO IT, BUT SO CAN JACK AND JOHN! PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—George Theodoratus, Washington State college's giant football tackle, heavyweight boxer and weight man, fears he was born just a few years too late.

In any other year but the present George's feats of putting the 18-pound shot would have claimed headlines from coast to coast, but he has been overshadowed by the tremendous 54 and 55-foot casts of Stanford's John Lyman and Louisiana State's Jack Torrance.
