and Seattle with messages for every mayor on Puget Sound and the coast. Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland notified Smith that Portland would co-operate in plans to open under police protection to non-union workers.

The executive committee of the Seattle longshore union sought a conference with Smith to protest against force and possibly to make further negotiations but the mayor said this seemed impossible in view of the union attitude.

Police early today surprised sleeping guards outside the headquarters of the salora union of the Pacific and seized 48 hockey baseball bats in three automobiles.

Mayor Smith has proclaimed an emergency "involving the peace and safety of all citizens" exists and police are mobilized to await orders. Mayor Smith has assumed personal command and declares he proposes to open the port for commerce.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15 (AP)—Direct intervention by President Roosevelt was urged today by the Industrial Association of San Francisco which charged "the radical element" among the 12,000 striking longshoremen had rejected settlements accepted by their own leaders and approved by federal mediators.

Reports of efforts to bring about a general strike of all union labor in support of the longshoremen, who have already been joined by 15,000 other maritime workers, persisted here. Leaders of the teamsters' union, which has refused to move freight to and from the docks, have figured prominently in peace negotiations.

Darrow, Still the "Super-Skeptic", Eats Spinach, Tones Down Blasts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Clarence Darrow, now going on 78, eats spinach twice a day, speaks in a nap in the afternoon and voices his blasts at "the so-called human race" more softly—but he still remains the super-skeptic.

America's most celebrated criminal lawyer and "the world's most famous infidel," as William Jennings Bryan called him, obviously has lost some of the fire he had in Tennessee evolution trial days, but there are many sparks left.

He still laughs at some of the "damned duties in America," but, as chairman of the board which studied the NRA and some of its codes in the interests of small businesses, he withheld his lash with respect to the recovery program pending the public release of the board's report on NRA to the president.

"Dickering, Cheating And Hating" But over a dish of spinach — he often carries his tray himself in the cafeteria of the Pennsylvania avenue hotel that is his Washington residence and office — he will let go with sporadic shafts of ratty sarcasm.

He will tell you that there is more general hatred today among the nations than at any time since the middle ages, that people "go on dickering, cheating and hating" and that "this is about the worst period we ever had. The idiotic nations set up crazy tariff walls and branded as public enemies other people who wanted to sell their things to eat and wear."

To him, the United States, in particular, "is cursed with the disease of money-getting which the depression didn't cure at all, the preachers are still ranting and no one is showing any signs of turning the other cheek as Christ told them to do."

Harming "The Poor Drunkard" Darrow says repeal of the eighteenth amendment was a step forward, but he fears that "with the federal government taking its bite, the states getting in their nibbles, the high taxes on liquor have put a terrible burden on the poor drunkard."

There have been some improvements, he says, in physical comfort in the last 30 years, but the average man is not so happy as he was.

To many, Darrow seems a bit incongruous in the role of a new deal official. He appears to belong quite definitely to the old school of rugged individualists with some of the ruggedness worn off by the years. His

800,000 NEW HOMES A YEAR

According to the Research Department of the NRA, an annual building volume of 800,000 residential units is required to supply the need for new dwellings. This takes no account of replacement of existing sub-standard homes, and until these are replaced the needed volume could easily be at the rate of 2,000,000 structures a year. A building revival could fall far below these high limits, and still be the most powerful of factors in fighting depression. No dollar we spend does more work, in stimulating domestic trade and providing employment, than does the building dollar.

Surveys show that 37.3 per cent of all the money spent goes to labor at the site—so excavators, graders, carpenters, masons, plasterers, etc. The balance of 62.7 per cent goes to buy needed materials and supplies — and the great bulk of that is paid to workers in the plants and factories manufacturing them. In general about eighty cents out of each dollar goes to labor, directly or indirectly.

The heavy industries — those supplying such manufactures as steel, lumber, cement — were hit hardest by hard times. They are facing the gravest difficulties in recovering from them. Spurring construction would do much to solve a legion of our most troublesome problems.

WOULD GIVE U. S. BERMUDA ISLE IN DEBT PAYMENT

LONDON, June 15 (AP)—A proposal that Great Britain turn over Bermuda or some other islands near the American coast to the United States as a "payment in kind" on war debts will be made in the house of commons next week.

Captain Arthur Evans, a conservative, gave notice today that he would ask Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald if the government plans to reply to the United States' note suggesting payment in goods and if it will consider "handing over Bermuda or some other island territories, adjacent to the United States which are no longer of defensive value to the British empire."
