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Peas Are Green

THE princess in the fairy tale established her claim to royal birth by being able to notice the presence of a single pea under a heap of mattresses piled on her bed. The modern pea-test is quite a different one. By making sure that peas are noticed on the menu, modern princesses establish their right to wear a culinary crown.

Peas Rank High One of the first maxima of a queen of cookery is: "Peas are green; and the housewife is green who doesn't know that there are dozens of ways to make delectable dishes with them. Such as—Curried Pea Omelet: Make an omelet as usual of three eggs, three tablespoons milk and half a teaspoon salt. Combine one tablespoon butter, one tablespoon flour, a quarter of a teaspoon salt, three-eighths of a teaspoon curry powder, and three-fourths of a cup milk to make a white sauce. Add three-fourths of a cup canned peas to the sauce, and pour it over the hot omelet just before folding it over onto the platter. This serves four. (In doubling quantity for eight persons, it is better to use two omelets than one large one of six eggs.)

Simple Pea Recipes Peas with Fresh Tomatoes: Cut three or four hot red soft tomatoes in pieces, and saute them gently in three tablespoons butter until soft. Season well and add the contents of one No. 2 can of peas. Heat well. This serves eight.

Corn and Pea Farinole: Combine and heat one cup of corn, two-thirds of a cup of peas, two tablespoons of butter, salt and pepper to taste. This serves eight.

Asparagus and Peas on Toast: Look over and break a bunch of asparagus into short pieces. Boil in salted water, and drain. Heat contents of a can of peas, drain and season, and mix lightly with the asparagus. Pile on buttered toast and pour over melted butter or Hollandaise sauce.

A Good Pea Salad: Peas and Apple Salad: Marinate one cup of peas and one cup diced celery in French dressing for an hour. Add half a cup chopped nuts and two large diced apples. Mix with mayonnaise.
