NEGRO IS LYNCHED BY 200 WHITE MEN

KIRBYVILLE, Tex., June 21 (AP)—Two hundred white men last night took Susan Williams, 38, from officers and hanged her after she had been seen in the company of a 17-year-old white girl.

Both the negro and the girl had been arrested for questioning. The mob stopped the motor car of officers as they took the negro to Orange for safe keeping, threw a rope around his neck, and hanged him.

Seventeen shots struck him as he dangled in the air. The crowd cut the body down and dragged it over the country behind an automobile, then dumped it into a ravine, near the door of a box factory commissary.

RESTAURANT CODE UNDER DISCUSSION

SALEM, June 21 (AP)—The controversy now being waged over the state over the enforcement of the restaurant marketing agreement was blamed upon beer dispensers who deal in food. This is a statement by Max Geilbar, state agricultural director in charge of the restaurant code.

Legitimate restaurant operators generally favor the code, the code administrator said. About 500 of these operators already have obtained their licenses and expect to be governed by the marketing agreement. Many other licenses were expected to be issued within the next few days. There are between 1,200 and 1,800 legitimate restaurants in the state, he said.

The only complaints by the restaurant operators included the right of the agricultural director to assess the cost of administration of the code, and against the provision that receipts for food and beverages shall aggregate twice their cost. The code, however, gives Geilbar authority to refuse a combination beer and food license when it is found the person making the application had failed to pay his bills and was financially irresponsible. Beer dispensers were opposed to the code because in many cases they could not comply with its provisions, particularly the matter of sanitation, Geilbar said.
