RAILROAD LOADING SHOWS INCREASE

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—The American Railway association announced today that loadings of revenue freight for the week ended June 16 were 617,649 cars, an increase of 2,084 above the preceding week, 24,890 above the corresponding week in 1933 and 99,251 above 1932.

Miscellaneous freight loaded totaled 247,402 cars, an increase of 5,223 above the preceding week, 15,725 above 1933 and 39,994 above 1932.

Total loadings for the year to date were 14,133,807 cars, against 12,092,943 last year and 13,120,546 in 1932.

All districts except the southern and southwestern reported increases compared with the corresponding week in 1933 and all except the southwestern reported increases over 1932.

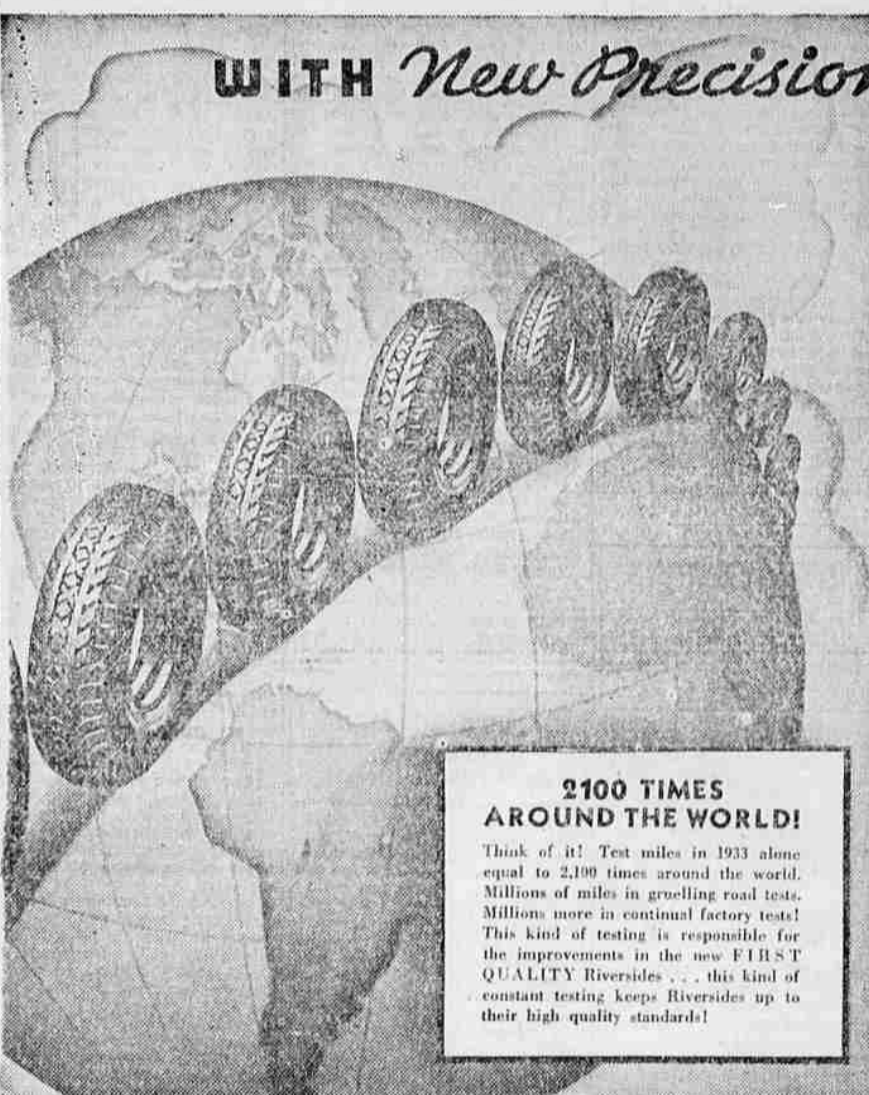

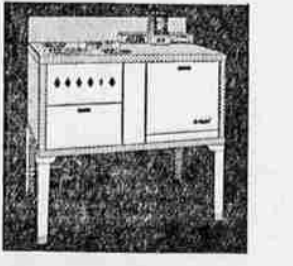
