Of the total of \$3,100,000, primary highways will get 50 per cent, or \$1,550,000; secondary highways will receive 25 per cent, or \$775,000, and municipal streets will get the other \$775,000.

A tentative ratio has been established, Chairman Scott said, by which Northwest Oregon will get 47.31 per cent of the money; Southwest Oregon will receive 17.28 per cent; 14.34 per cent will go to Central Oregon, and 20.10 per cent to Eastern Oregon. Scott explained that this ratio was worked out on this basis: population 60 per cent, area 30 per cent, and road mileage 10 per cent. He said the federal ratio by which the money
