night. He announced he will get in touch with waterfront employers today.

The assistant secretary of labor declined to state how far he was authorized to go in his peace efforts, but it was considered likely the new federal labor disputes act will be invoked if other means fail. Secretary of Labor Perkins previously asked the longshoremen and waterfront employers to submit mediation under the act which was passed by congress just before its recent adjournment.

Meanwhile an ominous quiet except for sporadic violence, prevailed along the Pacific coast waterfronts as authorities moved quietly to protect lives and property. If shippers and industrial groups carry out their announced intention of breaking the 68-day-old strike by force. Acting Governor Frank P. Merriam of California has announced that if the federal authorities fail to settle the dispute he will take steps "to open up state property on the waterfront to resumption of commerce."

At Portland, over a mess kitchen and 10 tons of supplies were moved to the largest municipal pier where special officers were concentrated. Wheat, wool and other products from the interior are normally received at the pier for shipment by sea.

In a surprise move at Seattle, supplies were rushed through picket lines to besieged non-union workers as several freight cars were suddenly shunted onto a pier. The pickets gave way after a brief skirmish with police.
