"I am glad to approve this bill," he said in a statement, "because it represents a distinct advance in the progress of prison industries."

NEWMAN TO RETURN TO GRID

NEW YORK (AP) — Harry Newman, one-time forward pass sharpshooter of the University of Michigan but more lately a star in progrid ranks, has recovered from a knee injury which developed from the 1933 play-off game and kept him in a hospital two months. He expects to play with the New York Giants again next fall.

The reason was that for the first time in years the Ku Klux Klan was brought in as a campaign issue. Graves, the first chief executive of the state to be re-elected since 1918, was assailed by opposing forces as having the tacit support of the Klan.

He and his opponent in the run-off, Major Frank Dixon, made one of the most intensive campaigns in recent years in Alabama, speaking in every section of the state. It was the first run-off gubernatorial primary the state has had in more than 20 years.

Whether Graves' election means the Klan must be re-elected with its future political contests in the south is a question with which politicians below the Mason and Dixon line are concerned at the present.

Robinson's situation. Nomination of Sherman Minton, lawyer and World War veteran, as the Democratic candidate to oppose Republican Arthur Robinson for United States senator from Indiana in the fall election offers an interesting angle in the Hoosier state political struggle.

Robinson has based his career in the senate largely around the fact that he has been the champion of the cause of former service men. He has been probably the most outspoken man in the senate against the administration's economy act which made such drastic reductions in veterans' compensation.

Whether Robinson, who lists in his official biography that he was successively first lieutenant, captain and major of infantry with overseas duty during the World War, will suffer by having an ex-soldier opponent remains to be seen.

Much more than this, however, enters into the Indiana senatorial fight. Those familiar with Indiana politics see possibilities of bitter factional strife among the Democrats as a result of Minton's nomination.

Generally regarded as the candidate of Governor McNutt, Minton may lose important party support. The faction controlled by Earl Peters of Fort Wayne, an unsuccessful contestant for the nomination, are bitter foes of the governor.

Mississippi's 'Three-Way'

Political insiders are speculating as to what Pat Harrison will do in the Mississippi three-way senatorial fight this year. The best information is that it all depends on what Huey Long does.

Rosa Collins, representative in congress, former Governor Bilbo and Senator Stephens are in the race. So far, Harrison, who doesn't come up for re-election until 1938, has shown inclination to be neutral.

SEEN ANY TEXAS TARPOONS? THEY CARRY CREDENTIALS

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP) — Note to fishermen: While angling in Florida waters, please keep an eye out for tarpons bearing Texas "license tags."

The local chamber of commerce has received notification from a naturalist at Port Arkansas, Tex., saying he is compiling data on the growth and travel habits of the tarpon. And he has tagged and released a number caught in Texas waters.

Now he wants the chamber of commerce to enlist the help of all fishermen hereabouts in reporting any marked fish caught on this side of the Gulf of Mexico.

A one-inch disc is attached to the dorsal fin of the tarpons he released.
