### Grandma Hug Beloved Pioneer

Another milestone was passed in the life of Mrs. Anna Hug when she attained the age of 88 years last Thursday.

Grandma Hug, as she is commonly known, was born in Switzerland, June 20, 1846 and while still a young girl came to Salt Lake City. There she met and married Henry Hug (Benson) in 1861. In 1870 the family migrated from Utah to the Grande Ronde valley where the members have lived continuously to the present time.

Mrs. Hug in her younger years was widely known for her hospitality, and her home was ever open to the young people of the community where joyous gatherings were frequent. She was left a widow in 1903 and has made her home since then with her youngest son, Eugene Hug. During the big fire of 1930 her home was destroyed, but she has become reconciled to her new home. She did her own housework until she was 92 years old. Last October she was injured by a fall and has been bed fast ever since.

Last Sunday the annual Hug reunion was held in the park and it is the first time that she has been unable to attend.

Her family consists of four sons, one daughter, eight grandchildren and sixteen great-grandchildren, all living in the Grande Ronde valley.

Grandma Hug is the last survivor of the original family who came from Switzerland, and the Hug relations commemorate her birthday the last Sunday of each June.

### UNCLE SAM BECOMES BANKER

People who like to sit back and discuss whether the government ought to take over banking, might stop a moment and consider to what extent it has already done so. Since the banking crisis of March, 1933, great changes have swept across the whole banking world, changes so sweeping that few realize them. The American Bankers' Association recently summed up some of them, and the picture it draws is enlightening.

For instance, we used to have 30,800 banks, back in 1921. Now we have something more than 14,000, a decrease of about 16,000 (over half). About 4000 banks have vanished since March, 1933. Several thousand banks owe the R. F. C. more than a half billion dollars on pledge of valuable parts of their assets.

The R. F. C. has taken more than a billion dollars worth of stock in 6400 banks by way of increasing capitalization, including many of the strongest banks in the country. Thus it has an interest in 44 per cent of all banks today. A million people and institutions have borrowed from the 5800 loaning associations and corporations started by the government to extend various types of credit.

The R. F. C. also has direct loans to various corporations totaling around \$700,000,000.

In the deposit field, the postal savings system has grown amazingly. More than 2,500,000 people now have savings on deposit in the 8000 postoffices authorized to receive them. A thousand such offices have had to be added during the last four years.

Private agencies have virtually abdicated from the credit field, the survey indicates. From 1922-1931 securities floated in private capital markets averaged more than five billions a year. During 1932-1933 these issues shrunk to \$621,000,000 a year, a decrease of almost 90 per cent. Somebody had to do the financing. So the treasury did it.

Add in the fact of federal deposit insurance, giving another government agency a direct interest in banking. Deuce of the security business from commercial banking puts a new complexion on the whole field, and the influence of the Federal Reserve System is admittedly rising.

So when you hear a discussion of whether the government ought to go into banking, it's well to realize right at the outset that the government is already in banking—right up to the hips.

### AMERICANS LAG IN FINAL ROUNDS OF BRITISH OPEN

**SANDWICH, Eng. June 27 (AP)** — Fred Taggart, a British professional set the early pace today in the final round of the British open golf championship, shooting the Royal St. Georges course in 70, two under par.

Taggart scored the outward nine in 34 strokes, two under regulation figures, and came home in par 36.

Bert Nelson, another British pro posted a 71 fashioned from an outgoing 36 and a smart incoming 35.

Gene Baranen, the 1932 champion, and betting odds favorite wasted strokes on the green and negotiated the first round in 79. Gene was out in 37 and back in 38, including a six on the par four 13th hole.

Robert Sweeney, American student at Oxford university, who qualified for the championship with 145, used up 80 strokes. Sweeney played the first 13 holes in one over perfect figure, and then completely "blew up."

Bill Laidlaw of Great Britain projected himself close to the front of the field with a 71. Laidlaw went out in 34 and then lost a stroke to par for an incoming 37. It was his second 71 over this course in two days.

MacDonald Smith, the transplanted veteran Scot, who holds forth at Nashville, Tenn., found the greens
