

Walter Pierce Is Speaker At Pomona Grange

GRANGE HALL (Special) — Walter Pierce, Oregon congressman, who returned to his home in the valley Friday after being in Washington, D. C. for the last six months on congressional duty, was one of the principle speakers at the Pomona grange meeting which was held with the Blue Mt. grange Saturday. Representative Pierce described the trip from La Grande to San Francisco, from San Francisco through the Panama canal to New York and then on to Washington, when he and Mrs. Pierce left last winter for the national capital. He told many interesting occurrences that impressed him while in Washington and he also talked of conditions as he saw them in the east.

Another speaker, whose speech was well received, was H. H. Hampton, assistant county agent. He had for his subject, "Four-H Clubs of Union County." He said the largest dairy club in Eastern Oregon is at Union. He stated that a club or two in forestry work is to be organized. He encouraged more clubs in farm record keeping be organized, there now being only one with D. E. Richards of the Union experiment station in charge. Mr. Hampton outlined a plan to create a fund to send deserving 4-H club members to summer school.

Other program numbers which were presented during the afternoon session at which time Mrs. Cusick, of Wolf Creek, county lecturer, and charge were the memorial services and two songs, the first, "Wagon Wheels" by Kenneth Hagain, the second, "Old Spinning Wheel" by Kenneth and his sister, Edith Hagain. Charles Wicklander, state deputy for Eastern Oregon, concluded the program by explaining the new plan worked out by grange insurance agents to put insurance on a better business basis. He also spoke of the grange plan of cooperative buying of gasoline and oil.

At the morning session, with Frank Wright, master, in the chair, business routine, including committee appointments, state grange reports and resolutions were taken care of. In the evening several candidates took the fifth degree initiatory work. Alvin Dodson, Cecil Dodson, O. C. and Maggie Fishman.

Blue Mt. grange, with Mrs. Albert Romann, H. E. C. chairman, in charge, served dinner and supper. There were more than 60 in attendance, including representatives from Cove, Pleasant Grove, Rock Wall, Cricket Flat and Wolf Creek granges, as well as a large number of members of the entertaining grange.

OREGON BAR EXAMINATION TO BE GIVEN

Final arrangements have been made for the conducting of the 1934 bar examinations at Salem, July 10 and 11, according to Colon R. Eberhard, Eastern Oregon member of the board of bar examiners. The questions for these examinations have been decided upon and are now in the process of being printed.

Carl Coad, of Cove, who was graduated in law from the University of Oregon this year, is the only Union county applicant for these examinations. In all there is a total of 132 who have signified their intention of taking the bar exam and this is an extraordinarily large number. Hereafter it is anticipated that not more than 50 each year will apply under the new rules governing the examination. These rules provide that when an applicant fails twice, a period of three years must elapse before the examinations may again be taken, and then only on a satisfactory showing to the court and examining board.

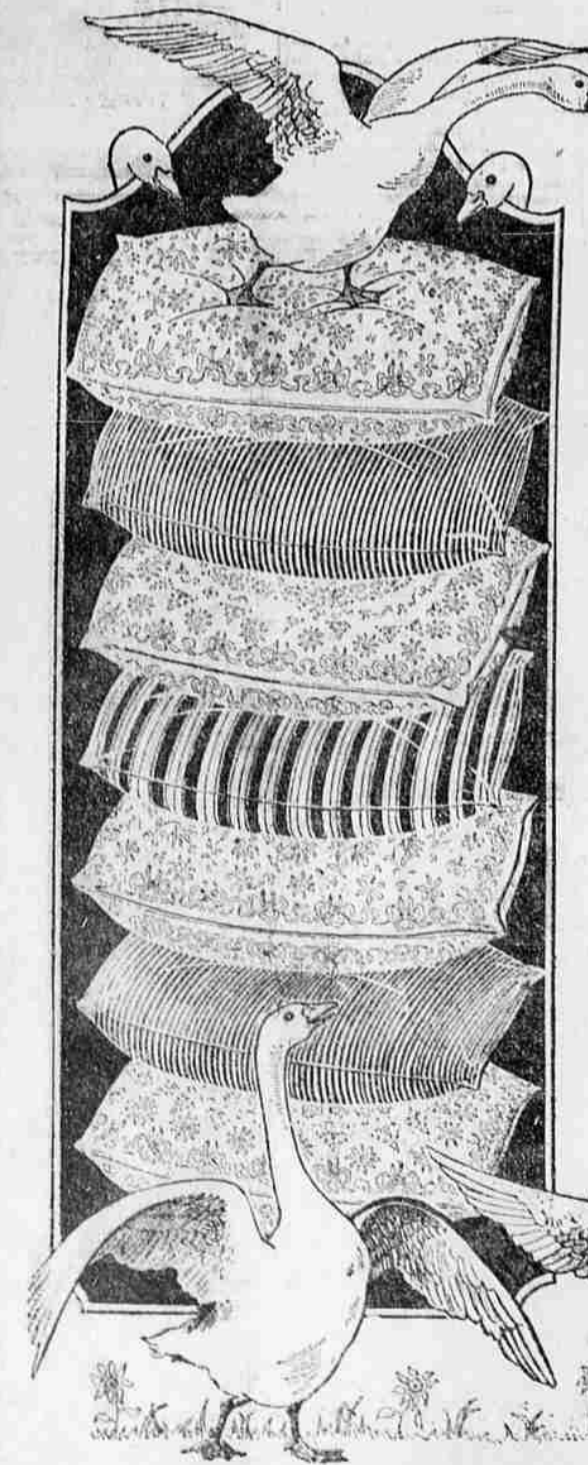
