COLUMBIA, Mo., June 28 (AP)—A man and two children were killed and four persons were injured, one probably fatally, when a gasoline tank car exploded in the Wabash railroad yard here last night.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 28 (AP)—A terrific explosion followed by a raging fire took the lives of three women and brought injuries to two more last night in the complete destruction of two two-story buildings in the heart of the Cheyenne business section.

The blast, believed by authorities to have been caused by the igniting of escaping gas, shattered the two buildings as if they had been match-wood, blasted debris that made nearby buildings look as if they had been under cannon fire and blew out plate glass windows of business houses for more than a block around the scene.

Stanley P. Stiles, 29, charged with buying, selling, concealing and possessing goods from a box car in interstate transportation. Cash bond was set at \$3,000. Stiles raised \$5,000 security bonds and was released.

Mrs. Lillie Belle Marvin, 43, wife of John Monroe Marvin, charged with concealing and possessing goods from a box car in interstate transportation. Bond was placed at \$2,500 but she was released on her own recognizance.

Three box car robberies occurred here that led to the arrest of the quintet. One robbery was on May 19, another on June 3 and the third on June 7. Police Chief Jim Steffen took a leading part in the investigation which led to the arrest of the five, and state police, Deputy Sheriff Hugo Klinghammer and U. P. railroad special agents participated in either the investigation, arrest or both.

The arrests followed sudden searching raids yesterday which officers say were quite successful in uncovering evidence.

This morning Nelson was confined in the city jail and Marvin and Mason were in the county jail.

BOMBINGS SWEEP THROUGH AUSTRIA

VIENNA, June 28 (AP)—Wide-spread bombing outrages broke out in Austria today.

Great property damage was reported in the disorders, on the twentieth anniversary of the famous Sarajevo assassination in 1914.

The bombings included: main line railroad near Bludenz; railroad tracks at Judenberg; power plant at Meuhlau; a cafe and printing plant at Innsbruck; power plants in Ruets, Achensee, and Hall, and railroad tracks at Hohenems, Dribbinn, and other points in Vorarlberg province.

Rum Board Expects \$2,000,000 Business

PORTLAND, June 28 (AP)—Something more than \$100,000 will be turned over to the Oregon unemployment relief fund on July 1 by the state liquor control commission which already has sent \$44,900 to the state treasury.

This statement was made by George L. Sammis, administrator for the commission, at the Wednesday meeting here.

Liquor sales will reach \$240,000 this month, compared with \$219,000 in May, Sammis estimated.

LEONARD GETS 30 DAYS FOR SADDLE THEFT

Sales for the year, Sammis believes, will reach the two million dollar mark.

Reading guilty to a charge of stealing a saddle at the Starkey rodeo on June 17, cost James Leonard 30 days of freedom. Yesterday afternoon Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles sentenced Leonard to a month in the county jail. Leonard, brought back to La Grande from Lewiston by Sergeant J. A. Robertson, of the state police, waived his grand jury hearing and entered a plea on direct information. When request for extradition was made Leonard was charged with a felony, but yesterday the charge was reduced to the status of a misdemeanor as it was determined the stolen saddle was not worth \$35.

MAN TRAMPLED BY BULL AT LOSTINE

LOSTINE (Special)—D. H. Magill of this place was badly injured one day this week, when he assisted a neighbor remove a ring from the nose of a Guernsey bull. While the neighbor, Mr. McOrtor had gone to the house, the bull got Mr. Magill down, butted him, trampled him, breaking three ribs besides causing other painful injuries. He was removed to the hospital for attention and care.
