

No Preaching At Christian Church This Next Month

Several Churches Curtailing Programs Because of Vacations; Some Observe Independence Day.

More curtailment of church services and activities during the months of July and August are announced this week, also Sunday probably will be the last local appearance of Rev. J. Tucker, of the Church of the Nazarene, who has been supplying in the pulpit here since January. He has been called for a series of evangelistic services in Salt Lake City. Some of the services Sunday also will be devoted to recognition of Independence day, which comes on Wednesday of next week.

Central Church of Christ (1208 Pennsylvania Avenue) Due to the pastor's being on his vacation, there will be only Bible school at 9:45 a. m. and communion at 11:00 a. m. during the month of July. 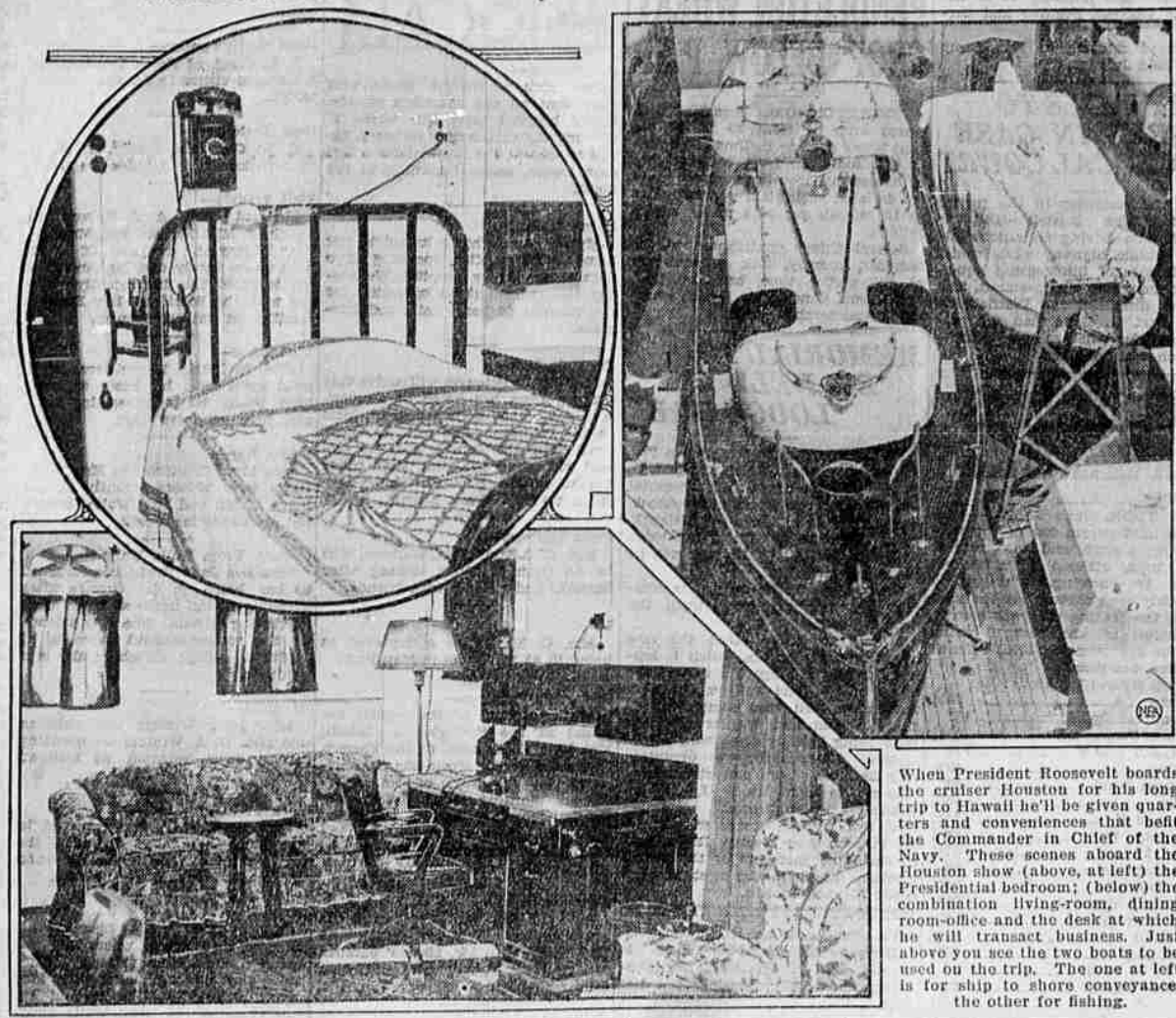
