Although the cry "get Dillinger" was shouted with new vigor by peace officers on the theory it was he who led the \$20,000 raid of bank bandits on the Merchants' National bank of South Bend, Ind., the trail they followed was as cold as the others left from time to time by America's arch public enemy.
