M. R. HIBBS' BODY FOUND BY DAUGHTER

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got in touch with authorities and Sheriff Walt Altman, of Grangeville, Ida., and Coroner George W. Trenary, of Kootenai, rode many miles on horseback to the ranch. Hibbs' body, meanwhile, was taken to Enterprise, Ore., for burial by C. A. Collinworth, who made part of the trip on horseback.

They disclosed after findings yesterday, that the charred remains of a man, undoubtedly the "nutty" one, were in the house ruins with a revolver in it.

Hibbs' horse was also found in a corral, un saddled but still wearing a bridle.

Putting their findings together, Sheriff Altman deduced that Hibbs had just returned home, that he was shot after he unsaddled his horse, that the "nutty" man then fired the house, and then committed suicide, also by shooting.

But no one knew who the "nutty" guest was.

Hibbs' body will be placed beside his wife, in the Enterprise cemetery. He was about 70 years of age and is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Barton, Mrs. Ralph Stickney and Mrs. Paul Butler, of Joseph; two sons, Earl, who had lived with his father until recently, and Milton, of Montana.

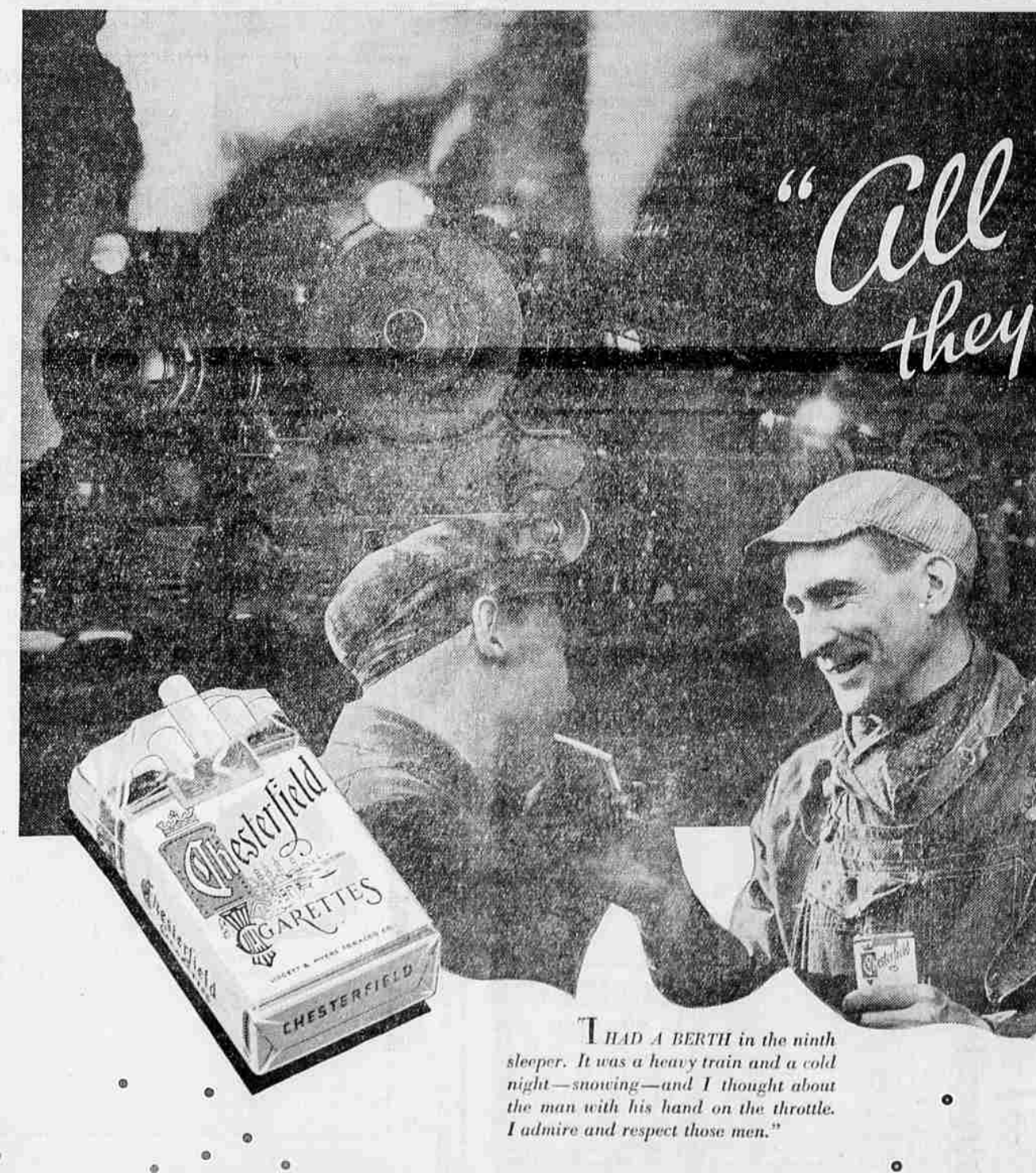
