Classes are offered in weaving, bead work, raffia work of various kinds such as basket weaving and mat making, pottery making, leather tooling and book making. Although this is said to be one of the most interesting and practical classes on the playground program, the enrollment has been comparatively small and Mrs. Chausse states that she can accommodate a much larger group of girls if they are interested in this type of work.

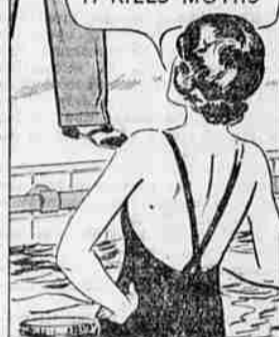
Dan Cupid showed over his 1933 efforts, old Demon Divorce also went into a spurt. From Jan. 1 to July 1 there were twenty-six couples separated by divorce decrees, compared with only eighteen separations in the first half of 1933—eight more than last year.

From these figures one may deduct that although there were more marriages than last year, there was a correspondingly greater divorce gain. In 1934 to date marriages were 29 points to the good, while on July 1 last year, marriages held a lead of 29 over divorces.
