

SEATTLE TAKES DOUBLE HEADER FROM L. A. TEAM

Holly fireworks at Seattle provided the Pacific Coast league today with the strange sight of another team, San Francisco, sharing first place with the mighty Angels of Los Angeles.

San Francisco moved up into the first place by winning the day's other double victory, licking the last place Portland Beavers, 5-3, 10-9.

Hollywood and Sacramento divided their twin bill before a crowd of 10,000 at Los Angeles, the Senators taking the opener 4-2 and the Stars the nightcap by the same score.

After zipping away the first game 8-2, the Mustangs came back to win the second from Oakland 6-1.

Miss Hartigan started strongly in the second set, breaking Miss Jacobs' service at love, to take the first two games, but the American champion settled grimly to her task there to run it out. The match lasted only 30 minutes and in boxing parlance was "no contest."

their heavy cargo burden by non-union workers under bluecoat protection. In Portland threats from a large group of strikers today persuaded a switching crew of the S. P. & S. railway to abandon any attempt to move oil and gasoline tank cars in or out of the oil terminals on the Portland harbor.

In Seattle two railroad trains guarded by police rolled into a pier to do some unloading and shippers there said the move broke a two-week waterfront blockade set up by striking longshoremen.

Meanwhile President Roosevelt's labor disputes committee working on the prolonged coastwise walkout of longshoremen and other maritime workers waited in vain for an answer from the various factions in the strike on its arbitration request.

As on Tuesday, when more than a score of persons were injured in the first clashes, the trouble in San Francisco started today after trucks began rolling into steamship piers owned by the state. The police, however, instead of

waiting, charged the union lines. First they laid down a barrage of tear gas that drove 200 pickets back for several blocks. The strikers replied with a few rocks, and finally retreated to Rincon hill, a high eminence overlooking the waterfront. Up the steep hill the police charged, and a pistol and gas volley was too much for the union men, who yielded the hill, shouting as they retreated.

On Harrison street, close to the piers, bluecoats charged another crowd of pickets, who retreated several blocks and threw up a barricade of timbers. The police broke through it, however, and fired shots over the pickets' heads as they fled. E. L. Hodges, an unemployed bystander was shot in the stomach and another man, J. Hart, received a bullet in the left leg.

Shortly after noon the strikers began leaving the waterfront district and in less than an hour scarcely a one was to be seen there.

Eight arrests were made—five on charges of inciting to riot, two on counts of resisting officers and one for disturbing the peace.

Because workers feared striking snipers would shoot them, construction of the huge San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge was stopped.

MARE MOTHERS CALF
