

Dr. Thompson To Preach Sunday At Church Here

Presbyterian Congregation to Hear Synodical Executive—Other Programs Are Announced.

Programs in churches in and near La Grande for next Sunday include the following:

First Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) Rev. D. A. Thompson, D. D., synodical executive and state representative of the Board on National Missions of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A., of Portland, will be the guest speaker at the 11:00 o'clock Sunday morning service. Time spent in coming to this service and hearing Dr. Thompson will be well spent, the pastor announces. The quartet, Miss Ruth Geibel, soprano; Miss Corinne Baker, alto; E. E. Hurley, tenor; and Ralph Geibel, baritone, will sing the morning anthem. Mrs. W. H. Parkinson will preside at the organ console. Preparation is made for each Sunday morning 9:45 o'clock Bible school hour, when classes of all ages will be given time to study the Scripture and life problems. All are invited. Christian Endeavor meets at 6:30 p. m. in the parlor of the church. Interesting program and discussion.

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue) Services at the Central Church of Christ Sunday will begin with the Bible school session at 9:45 a. m. This is a graded school and there are classes for all ages. Immediately following this school, at eleven o'clock, the Lord's Supper will be observed with the church elders in charge. There will be no preaching service.

Church of the Nazarene All services will be held at the usual hour on Sunday. Rev. Josiah Tucker, who has been supplying, will remain here over Sunday, July 15. The public is cordially invited to all services.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O Avenue) Church school has been discontinued for several weeks of vacation period at this church. Services Sunday include holy communion at 8 and morning prayer with sermon and holy communion at 11 o'clock.

The members of St. Vianney Sanctuary Boys and St. Vianney Junior choir will be given a picnic by the pastor aided by several volunteer ladies.

N. P. Plant Ices 400 Carloads

NORTH POWDER (Special)—The icing plant at North Powder of the Pacific Fruit Express company up to Saturday had loaded 400 carloads of cherries in transit east from the orchards of Washington and Oregon, which, with other carload loads shipped, was three times the business handled at the plant over other years at this time, according to Herman White, superintendent. The cherries are shipped in carload lots by railway express. Much of the increased business of course is due to the fact that the cherry crop ripened about a month earlier, but it is likely that better commercial and economic conditions had something to do with this very substantial increase.
