BONNEVILLE LOCKS BID IS \$3,895,592

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—The navigation locks and power house superstructure masonry work on the Bonneville dam will cost \$3,895,592. A low bid in this amount was submitted jointly by the General Construction company and J. P. Shea Company, Inc., of Portland when proposals were opened here by the office of the district engineer. The bids will be submitted to Washington, D. C.

Engineers here have said that no great engineering difficulties would be encountered should sea-locks eventually be authorized. It would be comparatively easy, it was said, to change sill specifications to permit a greater depth of water.

MERCURY AT 90 HERE ON FRIDAY

The mercury moved up to 90 above Friday, one degree warmer than Thursday, but not as warm proportionately as at Baker and Pendleton. At Baker it was 90 above, the warmest day in several weeks, and at Pendleton it was 97, the warmest since June 11.

The forecast for the weekend is for unsettled weather in Northeastern Oregon, with generally fair weather next week and above normal temperatures about the middle of the week.

Shackleton Name To Carry On In Arctic Exploring

LONDON (AP)—A student of Magdalen College, Oxford, is to carry on the name of Shackleton in polar exploration.

He is Edward, 26-year-old son of Sir Ernest Shackleton, whose exploits were cut short 12 years ago by his death while on the way to the Antarctic.

The son is to seek his spurs, however, in the opposite end of the earth—in little-known Ellesmere Land in the Canadian Arctic.

An expedition which he has organized under the leadership of Dr. Noel Humphrey's plans to leave London in July, sailing in a sealer chartered by young Shackleton from Norway.

The interior of Ellesmere Land is unexplored and the chief scientific work of the expedition will be a geological survey and mapping. The explorers plan to winter in the region and to devote next spring to northern Ellesmere Land. They expect to be away a year.

Shackleton, who strongly resembles his noted father in looks as well as in interests, is president of the Oxford University Exploration club under whose auspices the expedition has been launched with the support of the Royal Geographical Society and the Canadian government.

His principal interest is in exploring the walls of his room at college, are covered with pictures of Arctic landscapes.

Confers With Old Timers

The last previous venture of the club was an expedition in Borneo from July to December, 1932.

For several months Shackleton has been busy learning from polar experts as much as he could concerning Polar equipment and conditions.

He has had conferences in Copenhagen with Dr. Lauge Koch, veteran Arctic explorer, and with the Greenland board. In Oslo he talked with Capt. Riser Larsen, famous Arctic and Antarctic flier.

Ellesmere Land, to which the expedition is heading, next to Baffin Land, is the largest of the Canadian Arctic archipelago, the greater part of which is an Eskimo reservation. It is like a deep saucer, with its interior lowlands flanked by coastal mountains.

TO BEGIN WORK ON DECORATIONS NEXT MONDAY

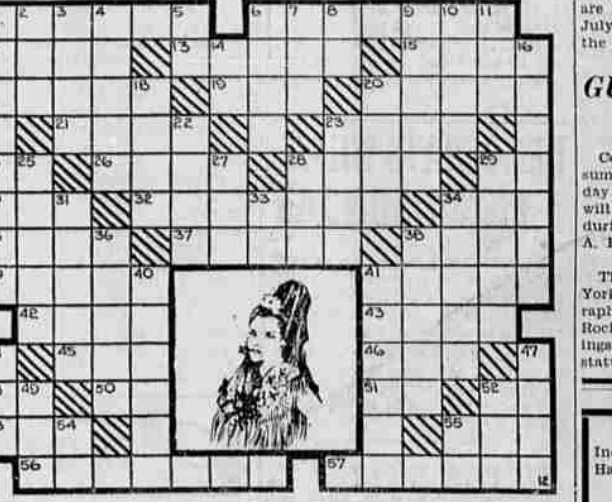

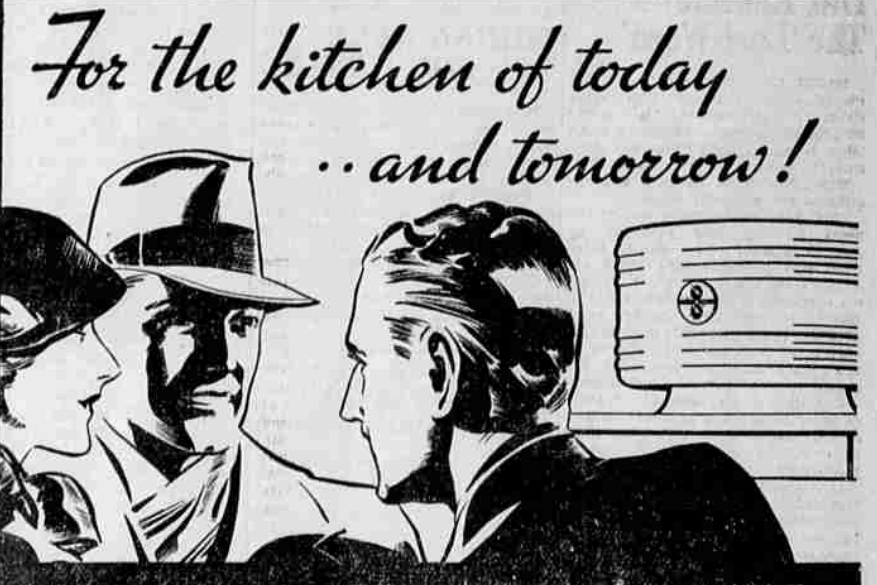
