The all-farm-commodities index moved from 70 to 74 from January to May with the previous year averaging 63. The lowest point of 49 in the last 18 months occurred in February of 1933.

Farm Commodities Rise  
 Farm prices have been affected by the drought, and many traders predict steady price increases in the near future.

The index of general prices with 1913 as 100 stood at 137 in April as against 133 in January and an average of 129 for 1933.

Retail food prices, which are of vital interest to the consumer, are affected materially by wholesale commodity prices, but an increase in wholesale prices does not mean a corresponding increase in retail prices because many of the factors which make retail prices average higher than wholesale are fixed.

The retail food index, based on 1913 as 100, stood at 108.2 in May as against 105.2 in January. The average for 1933 was 99.4.

Some citizens of Atlanta, Ga., opposed the building of street railways many years ago, contending that the streets were too narrow for trolley cars.

The number of beef cattle in Florida has been estimated at 1,500,000, and pasture land is figured at 25,000,000 acres.

Adjustment of prices which were very low 18 months ago has progressed with the lowest coming near or the higher prices near mid-year.

One of the aims of the Washington administration has been to bring the lowest prices upward by the greatest degree which at the same time increasing only moderately those prices which had not fallen so low.

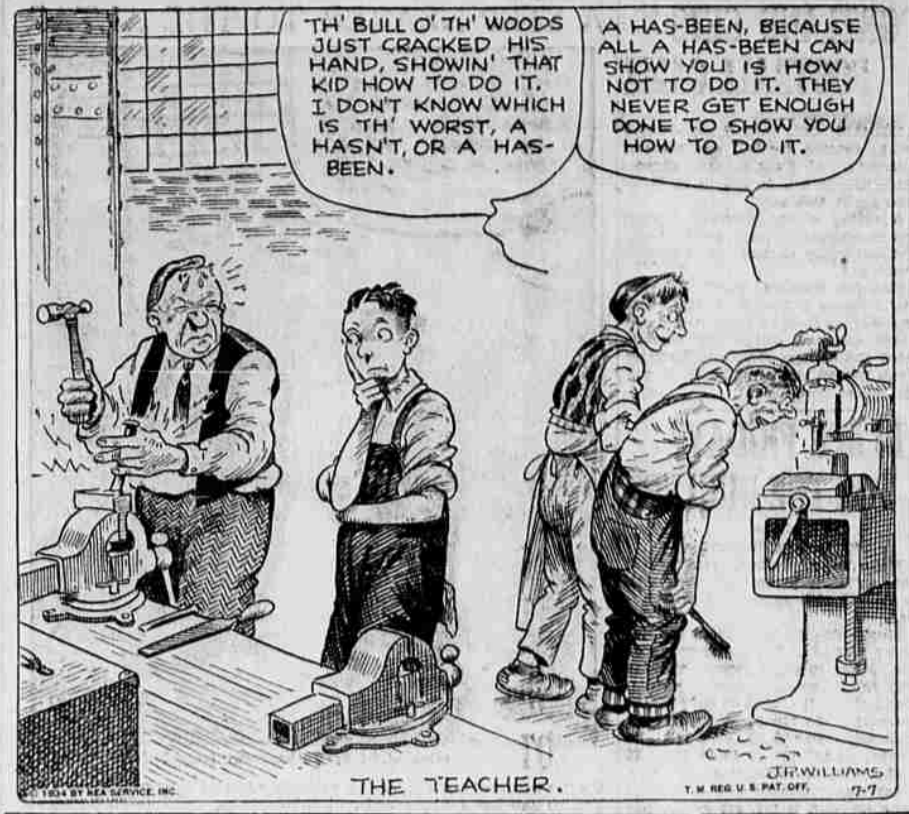
Standards Statistics Company's daily index of commodity prices moved upward from a low point of 66.25, January 2, to a high point of 71.11 on June 1.

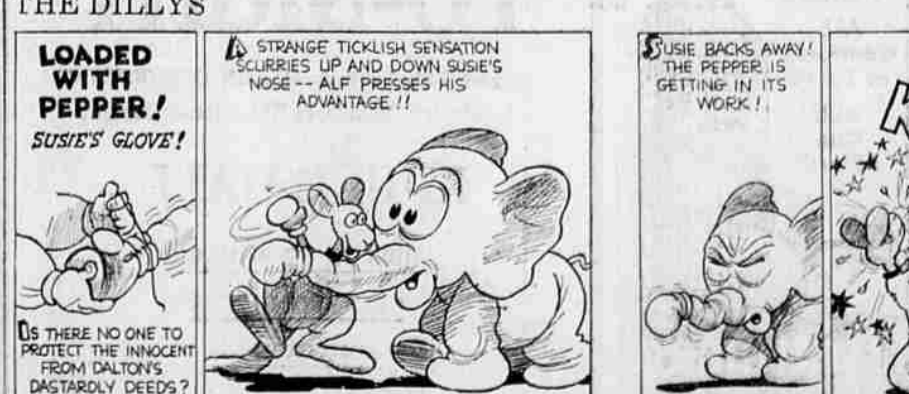

## Commodity Prices Show Gains For First Half 1934

 NEW YORK (AP)—Commodity prices, with a 1933 average index of 69.0, opened this year at 72.2 and climbed to 73.7 for May.

That index compiled by the United States department of labor for 784 commodities stood at 60.2 in March, 1933, the lowest point in the last 18 months.

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
