ruling by the higher court today declared. "Unless there is to be an intermingling of the legislative and judicial power to deal with contempt, thereby rendering it possible in all cases as a matter of legislative power summarily to try the one accused without subjecting him to the statutory mode of trial provided for criminal offenses, protected by the limitations and safeguards of the constitution, then we must and do declare that the senate is without jurisdiction to inflict punishment on the petitioner."

Leslie C. Garnett, U. S. district attorney, said a course of further action had not been decided upon, but that a writ of certiorari would probably be obtained and the case taken to the United States supreme court.
