Method Held More Typical of Celebration Than Growing Whiskers.

1000 CAPS TO BE SOLD THIS WEEK

Distinctive Head Dress Recommended by Semi-Centennial Committee For La Grande Wear.

Some titles when they stage old-time celebrations wear whiskers to advertise the event. Some adopt other similar plans. But in La Grande, engineer caps will be worn during the week before the opening of the Semi-Centennial U. P. celebration, which is to begin next Thursday, July 19. Of course, they also will be worn during the celebration, if the wearers desire.

The caps have been selected by the general committee as being much more typical of the celebration here than growing whiskers, etc., and 1,000 of the caps have been ordered and are expected here immediately, and will be offered for sale at 25 cents each. The celebration souvenir button is supposed to be worn on the caps, and those who have no buttons may obtain these for 25 cents also.

The caps will be cool, not unsightly, black in color and with a green visor.

The committee again today emphasized that no charge will be made for attendance at either the coronation ceremony at the stadium Thursday night, July 19, or for the pageant at the stadium Saturday afternoon, July 21. Many of the events will require admission fees, but these two are open to all free of cost.

The La Grande band rehearsed its entire pageant repertoire last night, consisting of some 10 or 12 numbers. The organization handled the selections in excellent fashion.

The hope that Postmaster General Parley may visit La Grande the last day of the celebration was held forth today by a committee who interviewed Rep. Charles H. Martin yesterday on his way from La Grande to Pendleton. The congressman promised to extend every effort to have Mr.

OPEN SEASON ON ELK SET FOR NOV. 5-11

State Game Commission Accepts Suggestion Made By U. S. Forest Service.

Despite the bitterness that arose out of last fall's open elk season in Eastern Oregon and particularly in Union county, another open elk season will be held here this fall, it was learned today.

Some months ago it was interpreted locally from a court decision that an open elk season could not be called this year without special legislative authority, but along comes Uncle Sam with the apparent authority.

Elk will be legal game in Oregon again this fall, the state game commission ruled yesterday in Portland upon the recommendation of the United States forest service. Portions of five counties will be thrown open to hunters for a period of seven days from November 5 to 11, both dates inclusive. Bag limit was set at one bull elk, having two or more points on either antler.

This marked the first official move in Oregon of the forest service in game management under the department of agriculture regulation that

800 Game Birds Placed in Union, La Grande Pens

Eight hundred Chinese pheasants, about eight weeks old, were brought to Union county today by M. R. Lockwood, of Portland, from the state game farm at Pendleton. Lockwood is in charge of allotting the birds to the various counties.

Five hundred of the birds were placed in the holding pens in La Grande, and three hundred in the pens at Union. The birds at Union, and most of the cocks here will be liberated over the valley after the fall open season, and the hens here will be fed through the winter in the holding pens and released next spring.

In connection with the attempts to keep the county well stocked with pheasants, sportsmen today were urging motorists to be careful on the highways about running birds down. It is estimated that 5 or more birds, most of them hens, have been killed by cars this spring and summer.

STRIVING FOR ARMISTICE IN DOCK STRIKE

Last-Minute Efforts Made in Hopes of Averting General Walkout.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10 (AP)—Eleventh-hour efforts to bring about an armistice in the crucial waterfront strike and to forestall a general walkout of more than 100,000 union men in Portland, Oakland and San Francisco were made on several fronts today.

The principal move was going on behind the scenes at the hearing launched by the federal government's labor disputes board, which expected information late today from shipowners that would have an important bearing on the much sought truce. Details were withheld.

In Washington Secretary of Labor Perkins expressed the belief the strike could be settled if the grievances of the nine unions which walked out partly in sympathy with the striking longshoremen could be submitted to arbitration.

Pending the anxiously awaited report from the ship owners the labor

Franco-Belgian Area is Given Protection By Agreement.

SANCTION GIVEN SECURITY PACTS

Two Big Powers Reported to Now See Alike on the "European Situation."

LONDON, July 10 (AP)—Louis Barthou, French foreign minister, indicated today on his departure that Britain will go to the aid of France in case the Franco-Belgian area is invaded by a foreign power.

Leaving for Paris after two days of conversations with British officials, he indicated further that Great Britain had sanctioned in principle the eastern security pacts in which France is participating, although Britain was not a signatory.

The French statesman departed this afternoon declaring that France and Great Britain "are agreed on the European situation." He expressed the highest satisfaction with results of his visit, reiterating that no formal pact of any kind had been signed

Gangster Guns Bring Down K. C. Political Leader

KANSAS CITY, July 10 (AP)—John Lazia, North Side political leader, died today of bullet wounds.

KANSAS CITY, July 10 (AP)—Gangster guns blazed out again today in Kansas City. In an ambush that brought down John Lazia, north side Democratic political leader, with wounds which may prove fatal.

The lieutenant of T. J. (Big Tom) Pendergast, Democratic boss, fell with eight bullet wounds in his body as two gunmen opened fire on him in front of his hotel, the Park Central, early this morning.

Police arrested Joe Lisaco, a north side political rival of Lazia's, and 15 of Jusco's followers for questioning. Detectives said they also were working on the theory that Lazia may have been the victim of gangsters from other cities, whose enmity he had gained.

The shooting caused a furor in political circles.

AFFIRM SWEET IN CASE FROM UNION COUNTY

The case of Ben Rhodes Grandy, a minor, and Ethel R. Grandy, guardian, vs. Sherwood Williams and the National Surety company, appellants, appealed from Union county, was acted on in the state supreme court today. The suit involves recovery on a bond, and in the opinion by Justice Ben Circuit Judge Calvin L. Sweek was affirmed.

SALEM, July 10 (AP)—Benjamin S. Burke, Oregon real estate broker, and his surety company, will be required to pay judgment of \$2,000 and attorney's fees on charges of fraudulently misrepresenting Marion county property in a transfer deal with Robert Richer and his wife, the state supreme court ruled today in a 4 to 3 divided opinion in affirming the judgment of Judge L. H. McMahan of Salem.

NEGRO LYNCHED BY MOB IN LOUISIANA

BASTROP, La., July 10 (AP)—A young negro farmer lay dead in an undertaking establishment today, lynched by a mob after officers reported he had confessed an attempted attack on a prominent white girl.

Three hundred men hanged Andrew McLeod, 26, from the limb of an oak tree on the court house square here late last night despite his cries and pleas for mercy.

McLeod was accused of attempting to attack the 19-year-old girl early Sunday near Jones, La., 30 miles from here. He was arrested Sunday and officers were preparing to file formal charges against him at the time the

mob battered down the door of the small brick jail house last night and seized him.
