hope that the Chaco war between Bolivia and Paraguay would be speedily settled.

"We, the citizens of all the American Republics, are at the threshold of a new era," the president said.

"It is a new era because of the new spirit of understanding . . .

"In all of our American nations there is a growing insistence on the peaceful solution of international problems."

"Colombia and Peru have rendered an inestimable service to humanity in the settlement of the Leticia problem, and the United States joins with Colombia in every effort to end the war between Paraguay and Bolivia, the only discordant note which remains in all the length and breadth of North and Central and South America."

ASUNCION, Paraguay, July 11 (AP)—
Advices from the Chaco front today said the death struggle over Fort Ballivian was proceeding, with Paraguayan forces gradually approaching the stronghold.
