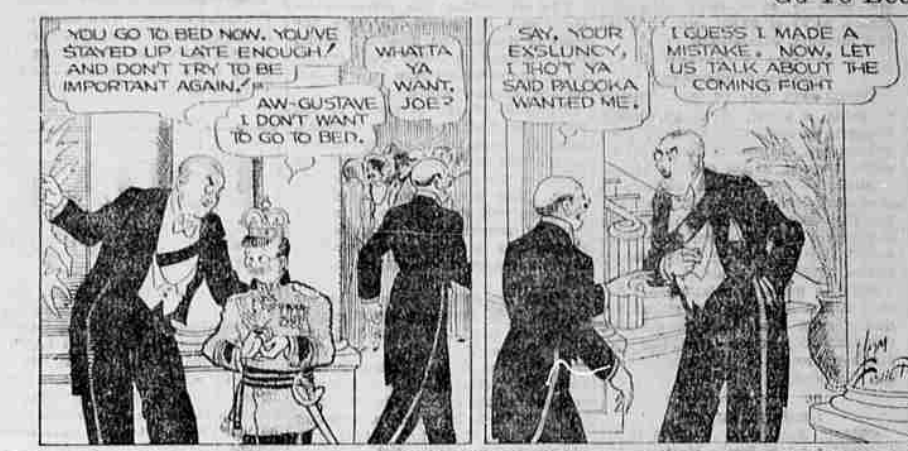

MONUMENT TO PIONEERS IS DEDICATED

used to further beautify the place until now it is quite an attractive spot and future plans of the historical groups, when completed, will make it a real mecca.

There is much historical significance attached to the locality as was pointed out by the two speakers of the afternoon—the Hon. Dunham Wright, of Medical Springs, president of the county pioneers and the Hon. Walter M. Pierce. Both gave many historical instances and incidents in the course of the two inspiring addresses which made their hearers feel that they, indeed, were standing on holy ground. This particular place was chosen for the first historical marker, because it had been the camping place during the winter of 1861-1862 of the Brown's, the Leary's and their city. As Mr. Pierce made the formal dedication, the monument was unveiled by Ben Brown's daughter, Mrs. Alma Conley, of La Grande, and his great-granddaughter, Miss Marcellie Conley. Grace Powers Wright read a letter from another daughter of Mr. Brown, Mrs. Walters, of Corvallis, who was unable to attend.

Rev. Clarence Kopp offered the opening prayer and musical numbers included an excellent number by the Mt. Glen quartet—Karl Joseph, Huton and Wilford Zaugg and community singing led by Miss Lydia Hug. J. E. Reynolds, president of the Sons and Daughters association, presided during the afternoon and announced the various numbers.
