- APRICOT-COBLER RECIPE**  
Breakfast  
Cantaloupe  
Soft Cooked Eggs

Lamb Chops Supreme  
6 loin chops  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers  
2 tablespoons chopped onions  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
2-3 cup water  
Wipe chops with damp cloth. Fill into baking dish. Sprinkle with celery, flour, peppers and onions. Add salt, pepper and 1/2 water. Cover. Bake 30 minutes in moderately hot oven. Turn several times. Add rest of water. Bake 30 minutes or until chops are tender when tested with fork. Arrange on serving platter and garnish with parsley.
- Apricot Cobbler**  
2 cups apricots  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
3 tablespoons butter  
2-3 cup water or apricot juice  
Mix apricots, sugar, flour, salt and cinnamon. Pour into buttered shallow baking dish. Dot with butter and add water. Cover with dough.  
Dough  
1 1/2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
6 tablespoons fat  
1-3 cup milk  
Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in fat with knife. Slowly add milk. When soft dough forms, pat out and fit over apricots. Make 4 holes in top. Bake 15 minutes in moderately hot oven. Unmold apricot side up and serve warm or cold.

## "Show Ears" Sets Vogue In Coiffures

PARIS (AP)—"Show your ears and forehead" is the rule for chic heads this summer.  
Shorter hair is "in" again. Coiffures for young heads are swept gently back from the face and often curled close to the back of the head in a manner reminiscent of a shining cap.  
Ears are definitely in the picture. Though they may not show entirely, most of the smart coiffures leave in view at least the lower half, often ornamented with an earring.  
Foreheads can be seen, too. "Skinned back" effects are by no means smart, but semi-wind-swept effects, curled softly back from the forehead as though blown by the breeze, are "the thing." They sound a note of serenity in keeping with the oriental ethos, so much in vogue this summer.

## Belts Washable, Too

Their belts and fastenings — also often washable — are among their most interesting features. A white cotton is fastened with clusters of rainbow colored crystal rings. A yellow linen is clipped with green galanthus clovers, and a gray linen finished with a kerchief scarf and belt of red and white polka dotted foulard.  
Gloves, blouses, collars and scarfs, capable of being tubbed and ready to be worn with both town and country costumes, are all over Paris. Linen and pique gloves in every conceivable summer shade, finished with kid or elasticated palms, are now a leading accessory.  
Gay plaid madras from the West Indies makes trim tailored blouses and cravats for linen sports suits, and white or brightly flowered organdy fashions those for more formal ensembles.

## Lingerie Trims

Little lingerie trims to freshen dark summer town frocks are legion. One designer fashions two broad white pique revers attached to a white pique belt to wear with a dark blue frock, another uses white barretted organdy girthing tied in a bow on one side, on black dresses, and many others sponsor trim with organdy jabots and frills at neck-lines.  
Three-quarter-length coats of pique, crash or linen are displayed with dark summer frocks and skirts. A high-length jacket of white pique dotted in black is worn with a black skirt and white organdy blouse, and a natural colored linen coat tops a brown artificial silk dress.

## Fashions, Too Paris Glorifies

PARIS (AP)—The most glamorous gowns Paris has created in years—topped by wide, eye-shading, flirtatious hats—have stepped out to the polo at Bagatelle, the racing meets and garden parties here, glorifying the new summer season.  
Fashionable women, mannequins and theatrical stars have thronged the polo grounds and the boxes at the tracks, their costumes, hats, gloves and slippers vying for fashion honors.  
Many of the gowns of colorful organdy or crepe were worn with the broad-brimmed hats seen here in five years—straw or dark velvet models trimmed with birds of paradise or a cluster of bright flowers nestling under the brim against the hair.  
Worth sent a svelte model to the polo one afternoon wearing a frock of abistine crepe (silk with a black silk coat and a brimmed green felt hat trimmed with aigrettes). The Princess May de Luxembourg wore a white organdy frock splashed with red and blue tulips topped by a broad-brimmed navy blue straw hat.  
Printed frocks have been favored by a number of fashionable women, and flowers are not the only figures to be seen on them. Madame Jacques Balsan (the former Consuelo Vanderbilt) ordered for the season a Molyneux frock, and three-quarter length coat of black and pink microscopic print, while the Princesses Amelie de Broglie chose a Lelone gown of black crepe splashed with white chrysanthemums and the Baronne Eugene de Rothschild selected a white crepe patterned with brown ostrich feathers.

**Hot Rolls**  
1 cake compressed yeast  
1 cup lukewarm milk  
4 tablespoons fat, melted  
1 teaspoon salt  
5 tablespoons sugar  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 cups flour  
Crumble yeast and add milk, fat, salt, sugar and 2 cups flour. Beat 2 minutes. Add rest of flour. Pour into greased bowl. Cover and set in moderate room temperature. Let stand until dough has doubled in size (it will require about 4 hours in warm weather and longer on cool days). Break off bits of the soft dough and shape into round rolls. Arrange side by side on greased baking pan. Cover with cloth and let the rolls double in bulk. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.

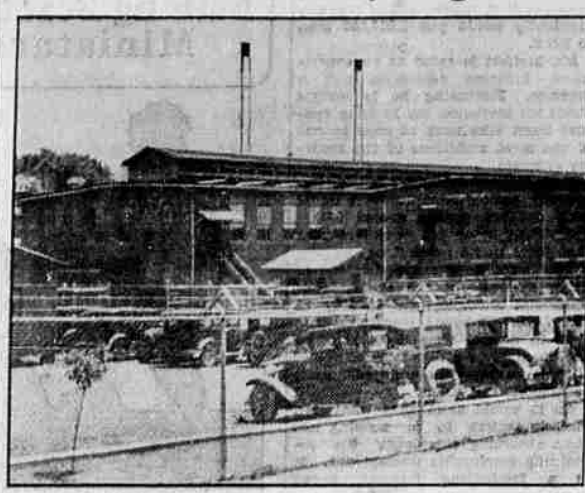
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## First Plant Closed by Eagle Loss



Here is the first manufactory closed in the country because its Blue Eagle was taken away by NRA—the Harriman Hosiery Mills, Harriman, Tenn. The emblem was withdrawn on federal charges that employes had been refused right of collective bargaining. Violence followed suspension of work for 653 employes.
