Homesick Youths Bemoan Nazi Plan Of Life On Farm

BERLIN (AP)—Hundreds of Prussian boys and girls are discovering that homesickness works havoc with Nazi ideals.

When the first contingent of 25,000 youngsters, in whom Nazi leaders hope to inculcate "farm-mindedness," left Berlin for new farm homes they were told by Robert Ley, labor department head, that their duty was to help farmers and themselves by outdoor life.

Tears, Not Heads, Roll
 Tears rolled, however, when the first excitement of departure passed. So, too, with the 450 children sent from cities to Luebbecke, the 50 who went to Lemoorsee, and the 510 in other places.

The plan, nevertheless, is backed enthusiastically. Children find it a change; farmers are glad to have their help, and officials think it helps the unemployment situation.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Scientists have discovered "heavy" water, and expert swimmers claim there is also "slow" water.

"Slow water," says Matt Mann, coach of University of Michigan national collegiate championship swimming teams, "is encountered in a narrow pool."

"In such pools, swimmers are slowed by eddy currents and waves after each turn. Swimmers make better time in wide pools."

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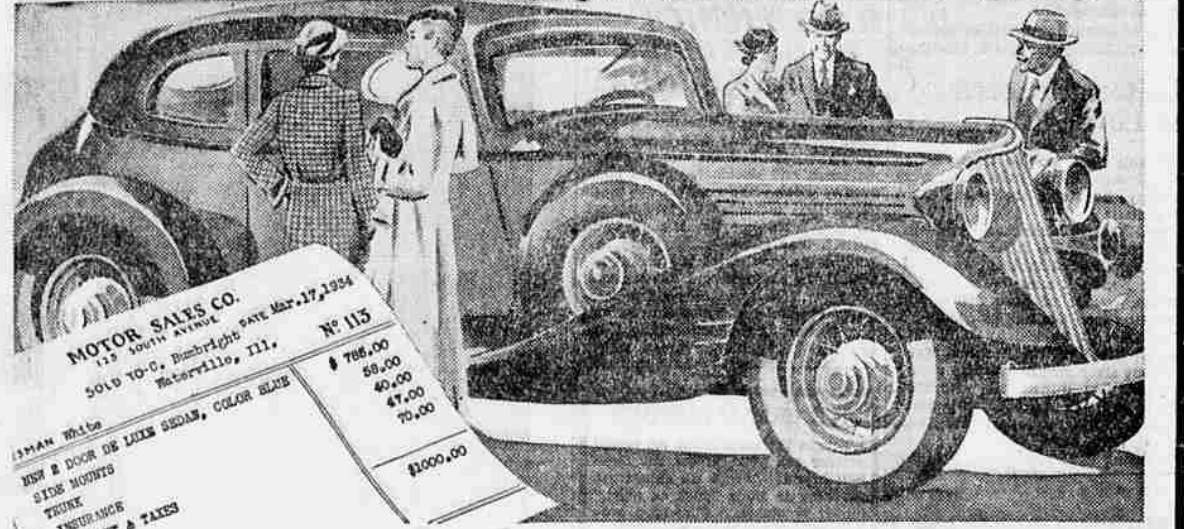
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
