dent's mediation board to report back on our resolution offering to arbitrate," Edward Vandeleur said. "We have been given to understand that it has been passed on by the ship-owners for their consideration."

Vandeleur reported everything "quiet and peaceful" in labor circles. The produce district here, patrolled by national guardsmen, was a scene of intense activity.

"Auto ferry boats carried full loads of trucks bearing fresh produce and as soon as they arrived they were dispatched to various parts of the city to supply grocery stores.

So many scores of laden trucks arrived at Oakland that no attempt was made to count them. Trucks without police convoys far outnumbered those with escorts.

"We will have gas soon," service station operators promised motorists as tank trucks began service.

Vandeleur said teamsters were still on strike with sanction for working given only those who operated gas-line trucks, along with ice wagon, milk and bakery wagon drivers. Butchers and culinary workers returned to their jobs.

Taxicab drivers, members of the Chauffeurs' union, were to meet late today to consider returning to work. Officials of large taxi companies reported that a "favorable vote was anticipated."

Meanwhile shipping companies went ahead with plans for dispatching vessels from this port, which felt the first effects of the strike when the longshoremen walked out May 9.

**OAKLAND, July 19 (AP)—** Scattered strikes of violence linked with existing strike conditions were reported from various parts of the Eastbay district during the night.

**WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—** After a long conference at the White House today, Secretary Perkins indicated the federal government still was attempting to settle the San Francisco strike on the basis that both sides would agree to arbitration.

The guards said Fred Ross, labor attorney and driver of the car fired upon, refused to heed repeated commands to halt for the customary "checking out" at the dock entrance. Senator Wagner was in a car ahead which checked out properly and passed unchallenged.

Police detectives who, under orders to purge Portland of communism, arrested 35 persons yesterday on charges of criminal syndicalism, revealed today that one of the taken into custody was found a letter from a member of the "Marine Workers Industrial union" of Philadelphia telling of "the gentle art of cracking skulls" used by strikers in that city.

The letter was dated July 11 and was said by police to be on the letterhead of the Marine Workers Industrial union, reputed communist affiliate.
