the uncounted ballots were sped to San Francisco by airplane, there to be tabulated by members of the mediation board.

E. P. Marsh of the department of labor, who approved the Portland election, left this morning by plane for San Francisco to be present when the votes are counted.

There was every indication here, and at Vancouver, Wash., and Marshfield, Ore., that the longshoremen had voted to arbitrate.

Meanwhile cargo was being worked on five vessels here, and it was

planned to take a caravan of about 20 trucks to municipal terminal No. 4 this afternoon. Police, however, had urged that hauling activity at the terminal be postponed until the result of the arbitration vote was announced.

All the talk of a threatened general strike was quieted until the outcome of the balloting was learned.

A shortage of gasoline, critical last week, had today been entirely relieved as all companies sent dozens of trucks hurrying over the city. Pickets of seamen's unions last week prevented movement of the fuel.

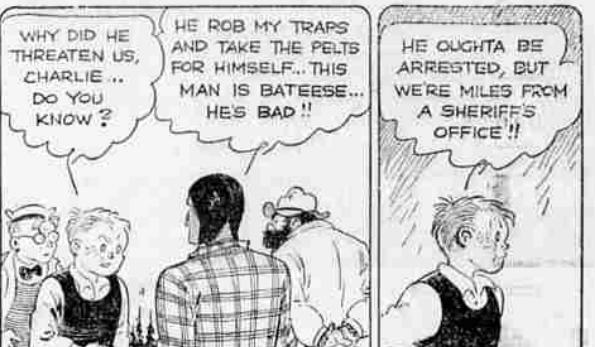

Rev. Mortimore Now Preparing For Conference

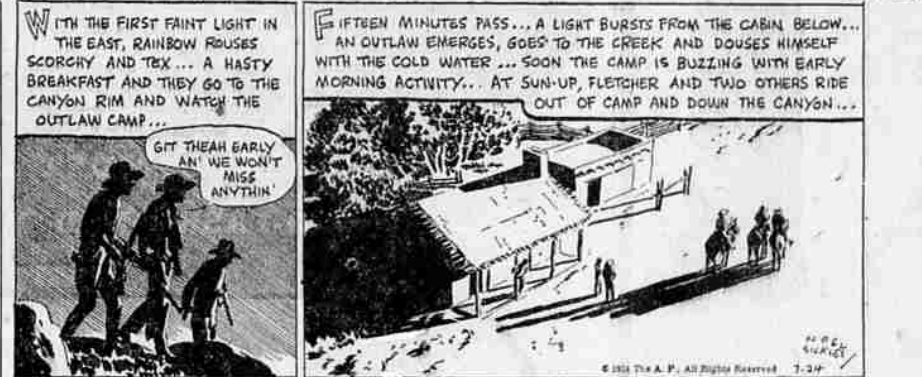
