Tempting Recipes

Baked Bean Soup: Chop one small onion and an eighth of a clove of garlic, and fry a few minutes in a little bacon fat without browning. Add one chopped fresh tomato, and cook another minute. Add four cups water, half a bay leaf, one cut-up celery stalk and the contents of one 1-pound 1-ounce can of baked beans. Salt to taste, and add a quarter of a teaspoon pepper-corns. Cover and simmer gently for an hour. Press through a sieve and serve with croutons. This serves four.
