## Church Programs For Next Sunday Announced Here

Many Houses of Worship Plan Special Services, Sermons For Weekend in La Grande.

Programs in the churches in the La Grande community for next Sunday, July 29, include: Church of Our Lady of the Valley (Rev. Thomas J. P. Brady, A. M., Ph. D., pastor). Next Sunday will be the last Sunday of July and the usual summer services will be held, consisting of two low masses, at 6 and 8 in the morning, and sermon by the pastor. After the second mass there will be benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Hours for confessions are from 3:30 p. m. to 5 p. m. and from 7 to 8 p. m. Confessions are not heard before the 6 o'clock mass on Sundays and holidays. Rev. Fr. Carroll O. M. Cap, of Hermiston, Ore., will conduct a tricenary in honor of St. Vincent, the same to begin on Aug. 8 and close on Aug. 9 with a solemn high mass at 8 in the morning. Details will be announced later.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O) Only two services are scheduled for Sunday in this church, holy communion at 8 o'clock and holy communion with sermon at 11 o'clock in the morning.

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) "Christian men are the men who keep in the straight path of duty; whose fidelity merits the highest praise; whose happiness is in serving others. First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington) Services are as follows: Sunday school 9:45 a. m., morning service 11 a. m., and Wednesday evening meetings, 8 p. m. The reading room in the West Jacobson building is open daily from 1:30 to 5 p. m. The subject of Sunday's service will be "Truth."

The golden text is, "Lead me in thy truth, and teach me: for thou art the God of my salvation; on thee do I wait all the day" (Ps. 25:3).

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "The Lord is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations" (Ps. 100:5).

The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Truth is the intelligence of immortal mind. ## CALIFORNIA BRUSH FIRE RAGES TODAY

(Continued From Page One) known outing site. William V. Mendenhall, United States forest supervisor, said that unless the raging flames could be checked within a short time, they would cut a path through Mount Lowe Tavern property, valued at more than \$100,000.

Pires were ignited today in the process of backfiring to check the path of the flames toward the La Vina sanitarium. Residents of the east slope of the Arroyo Seco have evacuated their homes on the order of Capt. Chester Allen of the Alhambra station. The fire has cut across the bottom of the canyon, and today was within a few feet of the west wall, but it had not touched the Angeles Crest highway.

"This is the worst fire in the Pasadena district since 1889," Mendenhall said. Later today the fire had been checked in its progress toward Pasadena, authorities said. Its closest approach to the Crown City was five miles, and its progress is northeasterly toward Mount Lowe.

## STOCKS RECOVER SOMEWHAT TODAY

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP) — The securities markets recovered substantially today, as the state of jitteriness over the Austrian situation passed. Transfers approximated 2,100,000 shares.
