Europe which, if it could not be curbed, might some day make the task on which their thoughts centered impossible of achievement.

"It was in circumstances such as these that we have seen in the majority of the nations who are working on this question of disarmament—whether actively at Geneva or with sympathy, as in the case of the United States, which is not a member of the league of nations—within the last year or two rather more toward increasing their armaments than decreasing them.

"The future is uncertain."

LONDON, July 30 (AP)—A reliable source stated tonight that the British government has learned that an official statement was issued in Berlin last Wednesday evening proclaiming the overthrow of Chancellor Dollfus of Austria in "a great popular revolt... as important as it is welcome."

This statement, according to the same source, was withdrawn a half hour later before it could be published in any of the newspapers of Germany.

The announcement the dock workers will end their strike Tuesday removed the threat that national guardsmen would enter Portland today to open the port. In line with Governor Julius L. Meier's hope the situation would not be aggravated today shippers abandoned plans to broaden operations.

Praise for the longshoremen for conceding part of their demands "in recognition of public interest in the termination of the strike" was expressed by O. K. Cushing, spokesman for the president's arbitration board, in announcing the decision of the men to return to work.

Pointing out that the men will be employed through the employer-controlled hiring halls that constituted one of their chief objections, Cushing said:

"The men believe they should not have been required to hire through these halls, but in recognition of public interest in the termination of the strike they have even waived this point."

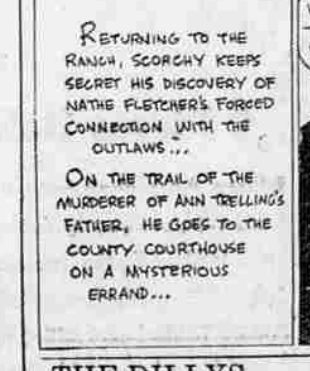
