for a three year term, three more
 payments will be made under the
 present contract.

Partners were paid on a basis of
 30 cents a bushel minus local and
 federal administration charges. The
 first checks, amounting to about
 \$115,000, were received this spring
 and represented 20 cents of the
 amount. The final checks represent
 about 6 1/2 cents per bushel due on
 the 1934 contracts with the govern-
 ment, with total administration ex-
 penses running about 3 1/4 cents per
 bushel.

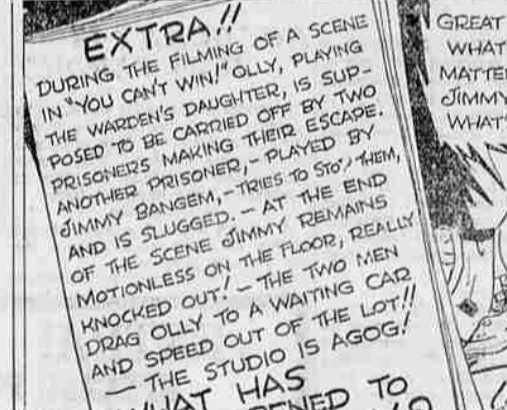
