Declaring the situation in the state following the recent widespread rally on Communist headquarters and moving into the streets, Governor Merriam pledged use of all power at his command to prevent interference with the orderly progress of government and business.

"The fight is of no moment now," said Governor Merriam, chief of the state bureau of criminal investigations. "The Communists are now organizing. The next attempt by them will be more serious and more violent than ever before experienced—violence in retaliation for the setback we have given them."

Merriam characterized the recent moves against known Communists as "California's awakening to the red menace."
