PROF'S CAMERA RECORDS FISH-EYE VIEW OF WORLD

AMES, Ia. (AP)—A fish-eye view of the outer world is being recorded by Dr. P. H. Carr of the Iowa State college physics department.

He has rigged up a home-made camera, which he partially submerges in water to record the shore.

The camera consists of a tin box with a plate glass mirror set on a ledge on the top. A pin-hole in the mirror admits a small amount of light to a photographic plate set on the bottom of the box.

Water inside the box up to the top of the mirror refracts the light, giving the same view a fish would have if it looked up out of the water.

Chats With Parents

BABY-TALK
Mrs. Smith still fondly quoted the mispronunciations of her 10-year-old daughter. "She still says 'bastik' for 'basket' and I can't example for her to follow. But to indulge in a travesty of the language when speaking to a child of any age is virtually to betray a trust."

The child is dependent on the grown-ups about him for his knowledge of the language. To teach a foreigner incorrect pronunciations or terminology would not be considered a kind thing to do, however entertaining for the teacher, and the pupil might well develop a lasting distrust of the person who had so cruelly led him astray.

The same holds true of the child. He learns his use of language from those about him, and in his early years chiefly from his mother. It is her duty, therefore, to give him the very best she has to offer, and not consciously to mislead the child or encourage or even allow him to make mistakes which he can correct.

with the government paying all costs of labor. It is estimated roughly that from ten to fifteen thousand dollars worth of work was paid for by the government, at a negligible cost to the district.

Other Items Show Surplus

During the year the bonded indebtedness was reduced to \$80,000, and the warrant indebtedness practically held its own, beginning the school year at \$83,277.77 and standing at \$85,903.34 as of June 15 this year.

The above figures on deficit represent the closeness with which the school board held to its budget expenditures a supplemental report of the budget for the 1933-34 school year last night revealed however that receipts are \$10,054.22 below requirements, largely because of the fact that payment of taxes is still at a lower than normal figure and more particularly because turnover of June 15 installment of taxes was not made until after school election.

Compared with the 1932-33 year, however, the showing is excellent, since the deficit in receipts at that time amounted to \$69,355.10, a total of \$59,300.78 more than it was a year later.

In addition to considering the above reports and discussing the loan and grant of \$80,000 to the school district for its part in the construction of the E. O. N. training school project, routine matters came before the board and Principal A. L. Gralapp presented an enlightening explanation of the high school course as outlined for the coming year. Thanks and appreciation were expressed to the board by the Semi-Centennial U. P. celebration for cooperation and for use of the stadium; bills were allowed; a number of requests by Supt. Herbert Evans for replacements, some new and necessary equipment, etc., were granted, a recommendation for the purchase of 300 auditorium seats for later date; Jennie Nielson was appointed as secretary for the principal.
