## Pension Law Court Test Is Planned

MILWAUKEE, Aug. 7 (AP)—Constitutionality of the new compulsory pension law for railroads will be tested, C. A. Miller, Washington, general counsel for the American Short Line Railroad Association, told a convention of 200 officials of privately owned roads.

"The railroad retirement act is, in the opinion of many lawyers, unconstitutional," Miller said in his report.

## Pope Pius Raps German Movement

CASSEL, GERMANY, Aug. 7 (AP)—Pope Pius today made a severe attack on the German national church movement during an Audience granted twenty members of the German Catholic Youth society. 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## Pacific Coast Highway Maps Now Available

Colorful and complete, new Pacific coast highway maps have just been published by the Union Oil company and are available through its gasoline dealers in this area. The series is issued in three folders. Simplicity and legibility of road information are features of the new maps. All non-essential material was eliminated to allow space for amplifying highway information and points of interest in each of the three folders. The maps, however, are complete and accurate, giving all the necessary road data for tourists and vacationists.

An additional innovation in the folders is the complete log of Pacific coast radio stations. This is the first time such information has been included in a highway map, and was incorporated in the folder to enable motorists with radio equipped cars to tune in as they ride, regardless of location. The log lists locations of stations, call letters, wave length, and power. An accurate map of the area west of the Rockies, and extending from the Gulf of California in Mexico to Glacier national park in British Columbia is shown in each state folder.

Inset maps showing main thoroughfares and cross-town boulevards of principal west coast cities, are also included in the folders. State maps have been cross-indexed to facilitate location of cities. The indexes include city populations.

MEDFORD, Ore., August 7 (AP)—Harvesting of the Rogue river valley pear crop will reach its peak starting next Monday, with the picking and packing of Comice, Bosc, Howells and D'Anjou. The varieties all ripen this year about the same time, which has the capacity of local packing and cold storage plants.

will assist farmers in holding their crops instead of selling at harvest time when marketings are ordinarily heavy and prices consequently low. They will thus be able to obtain some cash, keep their crops readily marketable as needed, and sell them at any time the price ranges between the loan value and the upper limit of the market.

The program would be coordinated with Secretary Wallace's idea for "ever-normal" granaries. In bountiful years the stored grains would be held off the market. Ownership would be returned to farmers without repayment of the loans if they would agree to cut production the next season. Thus supplies would be kept at about the level of consumption plus amounts assured of sales abroad.
