## Roosevelt Sounds Call For 'Action'

"This government intends no injury to honest business.

"The process we follow in seeking social justice do not in seeking to general property take from one, give to another. In this modern world the spreading out of opportunity is not to consist of robbing Peter to pay Paul. We are concerned with more than mere abatement and addition. We are concerned with the multiplication of wealth through co-operative action—wealth in which all can share."

## LAND BANK LOAN TOTAL FOR N. W. IN JULY HEAVY

Hot weather has not slowed up the staff of the Federal Land bank of Spokane in their job of making land bank and land bank commissioner's loans to farmers of the four Pacific northwest states, according to a report received today from the bank by Chas. H. Reynolds, secretary-treasurer of the Grande Ronde National Farm Loan association here.

A total of 1854 loans aggregating \$4,836,000 were made in July to farmers of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

The land bank made 562 loans on its own account amounting to \$1,921,400. Acting as agent for the land bank commissioner, it made 1292 loans aggregating \$2,914,600. These commissioner's loans are made from a fund provided by congress to help the farmer refinance his indebtedness.

Current statistics show that this money being loaned is being added materially to the total farm debt. More than 85 per cent of all of the money loaned by the bank in the last year, acting for itself and for the commissioner, has gone to refinance farmers' debts; that is, to pay off other mortgages, the hardware dealer, grocery store, implement concern, etc. A substantial part of it has gone to pay back taxes as well.

Loans are about evenly divided in dollar volume among the four states, Montana, Idaho and Oregon each getting more than a million-dollar share. The tabulation of loans by
