

MISSIONS GAIN ON LOS ANGELES; BEAVERS BEATEN

Even the best of champions, including Gilly Campbell of Los Angeles have their lapses. Campbell, recently sold to the Cincinnati Reds for delivery next spring and generally rated the best catcher in the 1934 Pacific Coast league, heaved the ball over second base in the first inning last night to let San Francisco score the two runs that gave them their second straight victory, 2-0.

Campbell's slip was costly, dropping the Angels to within a game of the second place Missions who outslugged Hollywood 10-8 to pick up a full game.

Making six hits, including four batters by Boroja, Mayer and Steinbocker, good for seven runs, Sacramento downed Seattle 7-6 and dumped the Indians down into third place.

Decked out in their late-arriving uniforms, the Oaks battered three Portland pitchers for 15 safeties and an 11-2 win. Lefty Anton topped the Oakland attack with a circuit wallop and single as Lloyd Douglas scattered the nine Beaver blows through eight innings.

ROBINSON, FAMOUS OLD ORACLE, DIES

ATLANTA, Aug. 9 (AP) — That famous old Oracle, Wilbert Robinson, is dead.

Death came just as Uncle Bobby, one of baseball's greatest figures, wished it — quickly and with little pain. He succumbed to a hemorrhage of the brain last night at 10:30 o'clock and his last words were about the Atlanta baseball club of which he was president.

Robinson was 70 years old.

His span of life saw him as catcher and captain of the Baltimore Orioles; saw him win two pennants at Brooklyn in the National league and finally saw him worry himself literally sick about his club here.

Mind Your Peas

— and Q's

OR don't mind your Q's—they're not important. Peas, however, have a very important part in the business of preparing summertime meals, so it is well that you mind not only the can sizes but the pea sizes as well.

Canners provide cans of convenient size for various uses—nature provides peas of convenient sizes for various dishes.

For vegetable salad sandwiches use the smallest size peas; for salads, or for creamed casserole dishes, use the medium size peas, sized June, or early June. For soups or chowders you can use the less expensive, large peas. These are the marrow fat and telephone cans.

Tiny Cans—and Tall

Keep on hand the various sized cans of peas, so that you may open a small one or a large one, according to the demands of your recipe. From the tiniest to the tallest they range as follows: 8-ounce, 11-ounce, 15 1/2-ounce, 1 pound 4-ounce, 1 pound 10-ounce.

The following tested recipes consist of summer dishes with peas, which are especially good:

Salmon and Pea Shortcake: Melt three tablespoons butter, add four tablespoons flour and stir until smooth. Add one and one-half cups of milk slowly, then add the liquor from one No. 2 can of peas and the liquor from one tall can of salmon. Stir constantly until smooth and creamy. Season to taste and add the salmon and peas. Split hot baking powder biscuits, and pour the salmon and pea mixture between and on top of the biscuits. This serves six.

Pea, Cheese and Nut Salad: Marinate two cups of peas in one-fourth cup of French dressing for at least one hour. Drain, add one-half cup of diced American cheese, one-half cup of chopped nuts and mix with mayonnaise. Serve on lettuce. This serves six.
