## WALL STREET IS EXPECTING MOVE TO BOOST SILVER

By Claude A. Jagger (Associated Press Financial Editor) — Nationalization of silver, ordered by President Roosevelt Thursday, was indicated in financial circles as impending more vigorous pursuit of the silver policy outlined in the silver purchase act of 1934.

This for the moment, it was believed, meant accelerated buying of the metal by the treasury, and rising world prices for silver.

How soon the treasury might reach its ultimate objective of 25 per cent silver for the nation's metallic monetary reserves was regarded as problematical.

Definite information as to how this will be calculated, and how much silver will be required, is lacking. It has been assumed that the treasury, now holding some 500,000,000 ounces, would have to purchase some 1,000,000,000 ounces more, or virtually all of the known floating supply in world markets.

The prospect of nationalization of the stocks in this country, probably in excess of 100,000,000 ounces, commencing recently with the rise in the open market price to close to 50 cents an ounce, since the silver act limited the price which the treasury might pay for those stocks to that figure.

If the price should have gone above 50 cents without nationalization, the treasury might have had difficulty in getting holders to sell.

Active buying in foreign markets is widely expected, with the prospect of a sharp rise in the world price.

Wall street believes the federal government is pursuing its silver purchase program actively at this time as an answer to the agitation for inflation by various groups.

Opinion is sharply divided as to the effect of the list in the world silver price. While silverites hold that it will increase the purchasing power of the east, some monetary authorities say that it would have the opposite effect by increasing the purchasing power of silver currencies and thus having a deflationary influence in those countries.
