Get Schedule For Minimum Cigaret Prices

A government schedule on minimum prices for cigarettes has been received in La Grande by H. M. Howard, manager of the Safeway Stores in this district, effective as of July 25.

All standard 15-cent cigarettes may not sell at less than 13 cents each, or two packages for a quarter. Minimum carton prices are \$1.20. In this same classification, 50s sell at 31 cents, two for 62 cents or four for \$1.20.

Fifteen-cent straight cigarettes, sell at a minimum of two packages for 29 cents or a carton for \$1.38.

All 10-cent cigarettes sell at 10 cents straight unless purchased in the carton, which has a minimum price of 90 cents.

Under the new plan, the approximate enrollment at the various grade schools—exclusive of the J. H. Ackers Training school which is partially under E. O. N. supervision, and the teacher strength required, and the average pupils per teacher follows:

Central (8 grades), 405 pupils, 13 teachers, average of 31 pupils per teacher.

Riveria school (8 grades), 241 pupils, eight teachers, average 30 pupils per teacher.

Greenwood school (8 grades), 356 pupils, 12 teachers, average 29 pupils per teacher.

Willow school (4 grades), 89 pupils, three teachers, average 29 plus pupils per teacher.

Oregon's Drouth Area Spreading, Report Reveals

PORTLAND, Aug. 14 (AP)—Oregon's drouth area is spreading, even as the state emergency relief committee speeds its facilities and spends thousands of dollars to save feed and forage and to provide water for thousands of thirsty sheep and cattle.

None of the state's 36 counties have now been listed as drouth areas—three as emergency, and six as secondary regions.

Nearly 300 men, formerly on the state relief rolls, have been given work in the affected counties, developing springs and drilling wells so that water may be provided for parched lands and for thirsty livestock.

In Harney county 70 men are employed on the water projects; Malheur has 45, Grant has 40, Lake 30, Crook 28, Wheeler 24, Jefferson 18, Wasco 12, and Umatilla six men at work.

The relief committee survey indicated that a cycle of some eight years of sub-normal precipitation in Central and Eastern Oregon resulted in the serious lack of water. This situation had to be met immediately by the drilling of wells and the development of springs which livestock will be able to drink, had trampled down and ruined.

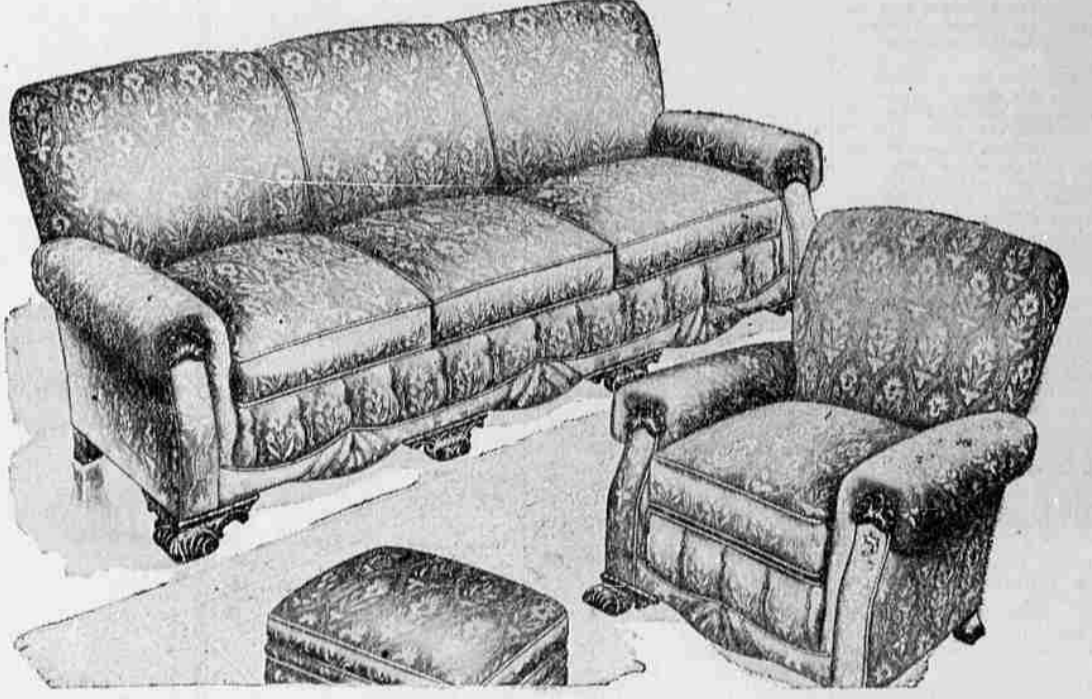
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
