because claim of the constitution because it was not a regulation of interstate commerce, and also the fifth amendment by being arbitrary and depriving the carriers of property without due process of law.

Employees of the railroads, under the law, would contribute two per cent of their pay while the railroads contribute ten per cent of their pay rolls. The retirement board has the right under the law to call on the railroads for advances sufficient to start operation.

## N. P. Ice Plant Makes a Record This Season

NORTH POWDER (Special)—The North Powder Ice plant of the Pacific Fruit Express company is now establishing a record for the number of cars loaded. Starting July 30, an average of 90 cars a day have been loaded here, with an average of 100 tons of ice every 24 hours. The express shipments have consisted chiefly of prunes, pears, peaches and some onions. Because of record warm winter and failure of the ice harvest, the local ice stock will be gone the latter part of this month. Beginning about August 20, artificial ice will be shipped to North Powder from the plant in Nampa at the rate of three cars, or 80 to 100 tons, a day.

The Democratic gubernatorial nomination in Ohio. Former Lieutenant-Governor Clarence J. Brown was far ahead in the Republican contest. With a huge vote cast, it appeared possible that for the first time in Ohio's history the Democratic primary might run up a bigger total vote than the Republican.

Nebraska's Republican chose Dwight Griswold, Gordon newspaper publisher, for the gubernatorial nomination, but the Democratic contest was in doubt with R. L. Cochran ahead.

In Arkansas, Governor J. Marion Pattrell apparently won the Democratic nomination for a second term, while in Idaho Governor C. Ben Ross, Democrat, the first chief executive to campaign for a third term, was far ahead of his nearest competitor, Frank L. Stephan, former state attorney general, was ahead in the race for the Republican nomination.

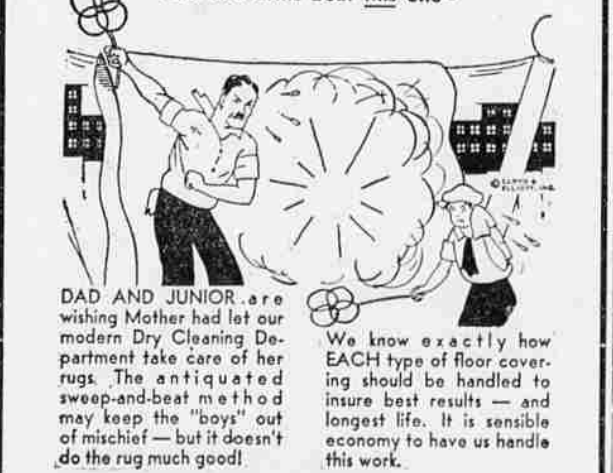

way department can submit further plans "which will more equitably distribute the projects and money for the benefit of the unemployed."

George L. Rauch, chairman of the committee, declared it was difficult to understand "how the state highway commission can reconcile its action of allocating but \$569,000 out of \$3,100,000 to Multnomah county when the terms under which the government grants these funds are that 60 per cent must be distributed in proportion to population, 10 per cent in proportion to area and 30 per cent to mileage of primary highways.

"Primary purpose of the money is to furnish unemployment relief, and more than two-thirds of the state's unemployed reside in this county."
