

SEATTLE-ANGEL TIE CONTINUES; BOTH TEAMS WIN

The power in Pay Thomas' right arm and Mike Hunt's big bat has kept the David-Goliath tie of Los Angeles and Seattle for the Coast league lead intact for another day. Thomas hurled the 1933 champion Angels to a 7-2 win over the Missions for his twentieth victory of the season, while Hunt's first inning homer was the deciding blow as the former cellar Indians upset Portland 4-2.

Hunt's four-bagger came with one aboard after Seattle had already shoved across one tally. Rudy Kallio let the Beavers have nine hits.

Tom Sheehan and Archie Campbell outpitched LeRoy Hermann of San Francisco to give Hollywood a 3-1 decision in a night game at Wrigley field and boost the Stars into a third place tie with the Missions.

Detroit Tigers Take Two Games From New York

Labeled as a "team of destiny" as plainly as if the words had been sewn on their uniforms, the Detroit Tigers were riding the crest of the baseball wave today as they faced the third game of their important series with the Yankees.

Triumphant in their opening doubleheader with the second place club before a record crowd, yesterday, the Tigers had a 6½ game lead with nothing more to do than protect it in the three remaining games of the series. They boasted two more brilliant achievements which alone the brighter after yesterday's 9 to 5 and 7 to 3 victories. Their winning streak had been stretched to 14 consecutive games, just five short of the American league record set by the White Sox of 1906, and their young mound ace, Larnwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, had his 13th successive mound triumph, three behind the league record in that respect.

Ancient Chinese City Uncovered As Lake Lowers

SHANGHAI, Aug. 15 (AP)—An ancient Chinese city has been found beneath the waters of Tai lake, on the border of Kiangsu and Chekiang provinces, Vernacular newspapers reported.

As the waters of the lake reached a low level the result of a drought gripping the area, the newspapers stated, the submerged city became visible. The city wall remains intact with streets and houses inside.

The alleged discovery, made by fishermen, is in accordance with a Chinese legend which says a city called Sunyang, an important commercial center, was inundated by a great flood which placed it at the bottom of the body of water now called Tai lake.

One wonders if those Chinese newspapers could be considered a hoax for Asiatic literature.
