Mrs. Julia Stella Seward, a resident of Union county the last 27 years, died at Hot Lake yesterday after a short illness. She made her home at 1703 X avenue.
Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Snodgrass and Zimmerman mortuary with Rev. Paul De P. Mottinore, of the Christian church, in charge. Burial will take place in the Island City cemetery beside the grave of her husband, who died several years ago.
The deceased was born in Illinois Oct. 20, 1859 and was 74 years, nine months and 28 days of age. When 12 she moved to Kansas, living there until 1907 when she came to Union county. Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Grace DeFellippe, of Wells, Nev., Besse Higgins, of La Grande, and a son, Frank Seward, of La Grande, besides other relatives.

FAVORS "PORT OF ENTRY"
PORTLAND, Aug. 18 (AP)—A proposal that the states of Oregon and Washington take over joint operation of the trans-Columbia river ferry service now operated by private interests, and that a "port of entry" be established at the interstate bridge connecting Portland and Vancouver, was before the highway and public works departments of both state today.

A proposal for a "port of entry" at the Vancouver-Portland interstate bridge was discussed with a view of reducing criminal operations and overruling law violators. Every commercial vehicle would be checked by officers of each state 24 hours a day.
