**GOOD FARMING IS REMEDY**  
DALLAS—The Hessian fly, which decreased the yield of wheat in Polk county, and elsewhere, from 5 to 10 bushels an acre this year, can be controlled by good farming, says J. H. Beck, county agent. The fly passes through two life cycles—a year, he says, hatching out in time to attack most until the young wheat is up in the fall. Many hares are never reached by burning stubble or pasturing after harvest. The best method is to plow under all wheat stubble as soon as the ground is ready for plowing, and work it down to a good seed bed so that the larva cannot work its way out, Mr. Beck says. Wherever possible, all volunteer wheat should be destroyed by discing or plowing, and if possible, avoid planting wheat back on ground that was in wheat this year. As the fall brood of the Hessian fly usually gets its egg-laying done before October 15, Mr. Beck recommends planting between that date and November 1. It is risky to wait to plant spring wheat he says, as lots of larvae may live over and wipe out spring plantings.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23 (AP)—With 13 men charged with first degree murder the state today continued to lay foundation for naming the actual slayer of James Conner, 22, in a labor dispute riot here Monday.

## Tomatoes Give Timely Tip

BACKLESS bathing beauties might take a tip, at this season, from no less an authority than the popular love apple. Tomatoes, scientists tell us, blush redder if the sun is not too hot. If you get hot and bothered about the sun on the beach, it is nice to know that there are sun oils and sweet-smelling unguents for every sort of skin. But if you are content to "ripen" slowly, like the lovely tomato, you will choose some spot where the sun is not at its hottest and there develop that rich rosy sun-tan that you covet.

## Scientists Study Blushes

Scientists of the United States Department of Agriculture who have made a careful study of tomato varieties in connection with the identification of the principal commercial varieties, found that the ideal red color of a variety does not, however, always develop to the same extent in different regions. Under abnormally high temperatures, or when the fruits are exposed to the direct rays of the sun without shade from leaves, the characteristic rich red may not develop. Varieties that are of a rich brilliant scarlet in the central and northern regions of the country tend toward a granadine color under the higher temperatures of the South and Southwest.

The rich red of canned tomatoes testifies to the fact that growers who have produced these perfect tomatoes for canning use, have coddled their crop, allowing them to grow under conditions which are best suited to their complexions. Not only have their flavors developed at their best, under these conditions of proper growing, but their health-giving content has also increased.

## Commodity Loans May Be Extended To Other Crops

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—The AAA, which has set the farm prices of 1909 to 1914 as a goal to shoot at, may seek to use widespread loans on commodities as its ammunition. The prices of the pre-war years, the relative golden age of American agriculture, are called "parity" prices.

Recent moves to increase cotton loans to 12 cents and extend corn loans to January 1, 1935, were regarded as a bridge between the present loan policy and a new one to be included in the feed storage bill to be submitted to the next congress. The measure would allow the AAA to extend its lending to other crops than corn and cotton, officials believe.
