## Church Programs For Last Sunday Of August Given

### Many Interesting Sermons And Services Scheduled For Sunday In La Grande.

Programs for next Sunday's services in the various La Grande churches include the following:

#### First Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)

In announcing his sermon theme, Rev. J. George Walz, minister, said "The empire of Jesus Christ is the greatest fact of our planet today. Over the highest minds of the noblest races. No empire, intellectual or political, can compare with it. We ourselves must all submit to it. Nearer, closer, than any earthly rule, it presses on us. Neutrality is impossible—the vainest dream! Therefore, laboring for its extension, we preach Sunday morning, 11:00 o'clock, on 'The Characteristics of the Growing Stone.' If not attending a service of like nature elsewhere, all are invited to meet with this congregation.

At the morning, 11 o'clock service, at the Presbyterian church, the quartet, Miss Ruth Geibel, soprano; Miss Gloria Swan, alto; William Caldwell, tenor; and Ralph Geibel, will sing Crowninshield's anthem, "There Is a Land Mine Eyes Have Seen." Mrs. C. C. Long, organist, will play the prelude "Song of the Angels" by Williams, and the postlude by Grey. The Sunday Bible school continues its splendid work of instruction and training of all those, from the little child to the adult man and woman, who attend its sessions. So also, the Christian Endeavor program each Sunday evening at 6:30 is arranged for the best interests of all youth that will attend.

#### Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue)

The Bible school is expected to go above the 200 mark Sunday. During the vacation season the attendance has kept up very well, being only a little below 200 at any time. However, with the beginning of the fall program, it is expected that this school will increase considerably and make new high record attendance marks. The superintendent is on a vacation trip to the east at present but all the departments of the school are going ahead as usual and there are interesting classes for everyone. Those not attending Bible school elsewhere are cordially invited. The sessions begin at 9:45 a. m.

The morning worship of the church is conducted at eleven o'clock. The observance of Christian communion is an important part of this service. The choir will present a special anthem, and the pastor, Rev. Paul Meritmore, will preach the morning sermon.

Christian Endeavors will meet at 6:15 for their regular Sunday evening service.

At 7:30 p. m. the popular Sunday evening service is held. There were a large number of people attended last Sunday night who requested that the pastor continue discussion along the same line as last Sunday evening. He has announced that he will preach next Sunday night on the subject "The Law and the Gospel." Those who are confused regarding the old and new covenants are particularly invited to attend this service. There will be special music by the orchestra and congregational singing which is enjoyed by all.

#### Church of Our Lady of the Valley (Rev. Thomas J. P. Brady, A. M., Ph. D., pastor)

Next Sunday marks the last of August with masses in the church at 6 and 8 o'clock in the morning. The pastor will preach a short sermon upon the Gospel of the Sunday, and holy communion will be distributed. Before the 8 o'clock mass there will be Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Confessions are heard on all Saturdays, even of holidays and Thursdays before the first Friday of each month, from 3:30 to 5 p. m., and from 7 to 8 p. m., also before the weekday mass and the 8 o'clock mass on Sundays.

#### First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington)

Following Sunday school at 9:45 a. m., the morning service begins at 11 o'clock. Wednesday evening meetings open at 8 o'clock and the reading

room in the West Jacobsen building is open daily from 1:30 to 5 p. m.

Sunday's subject will be "Mind." The sermon text is, "Who hath known the mind of the Lord? or who hath been his counsellor? For of him, and through him, and to him, are all things; to whom be glory for ever" (Rom. 11:34, 36).

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is a following from the Bible: "To whom shall we liken God? or what likeness shall we compare unto him?" (Isa. 40:25).

The lesson-sermon also includes the following creative passages from the Christian Science textbook: "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy; "Mind is God. . . There can be but one Mind, because there is but one God; and if mortals claimed no other Mind and accepted no other, sin would be unknown. We can have but one Mind, if that one is infinite" (p. 469).

#### Riverside Union Sunday School (First and Crook Streets)

The Bible school will convene at 10 o'clock and the subject of the lesson will be "Hosea Preaches God's Love." A poem on the lesson will be read to the school.

The worship and preaching service will begin at 11 o'clock and Rev. Carlos A. Plummer will deliver the sermon, the subject of which will be "The Love of God." All are welcome.

#### Gospel Mission (2201 North Fir Street)

Sunday services follow: Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. with classes for all; morning worship at 11 o'clock; young people and intermediate services at 6:45 p. m.; evening service of evangelism at 7:45 p. m. In this latter meeting the pastor, Rev. L. Carlson, will speak on the subject "A Place Prepared By Christ For Us."

Weeknight services: Tuesday night at 7:45, prayer meeting; Friday night at 7:45, testimony and preaching. Beginning Sunday, Sept. 2 Evangelist Bruce Gibson, of Winlock, Wash., will begin revival meetings here, every night at 7:45 except Mondays. All are invited to these meetings.

#### Zion Lutheran Church (M Avenue near Fourth)

"Pleading God" will be the theme of the sermon Sunday morning in this church at the worship service which begins at 11:00 o'clock. A cordial invitation is extended to all who wish to worship at that hour with us. Mrs. William Dietrich will play the service.

Sunday school meets at 9:45 for worship and study of the Bible lessons. The course used in this school is the Christian life course, designed to offer knowledge and to create Christian responses to life situations. All lessons are strictly Bible centers.

The Luther League, the young people's organization in the Lutheran church, will begin holding regular weekly devotional meetings on Sunday evening, Sept. 2 at 7:00 o'clock. These meetings are especially for young men and women who wish to think about and discuss life problems from a Christian viewpoint. All are welcome.

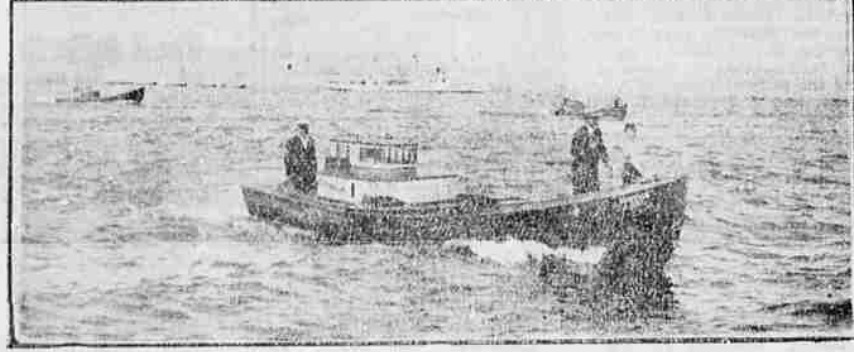
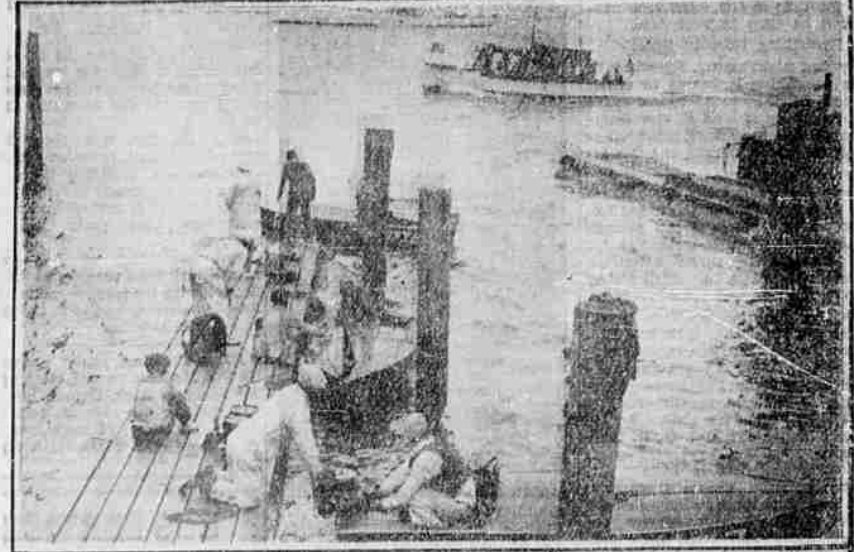
#### First Methodist Episcopal Church (Spring and Fourth)
