## Dairy Payment Applications Are Due Next Week

E. H. DeLong, chairman of the Union county agricultural conservation committee, today announced AAA dairy production program payments will be made on a quarterly basis to save administrative costs.

The period for filing applications will be limited to the two months following the close of the quarterly production period. Application for payment for the first quarter may be made starting April 1, he said. The rate of payment is 10 cents a pound for butterfat and 70 cents a 100 pounds for whole milk. During the second quarter the butterfat payment will remain the same and the whole milk payment will be reduced to 35 cents.

Producers who sell to the Union county cooperative creamery, Blue mountain creamery or Stone's do not need to submit their dairy slips, DeLong said, but others must mail or take their slips to the county agent's office for preparation of the payment applications.

## Battle Damage To Fleet Units Told By Admiral King

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27 (UP)—Adm. Ernest J. King today disclosed the names of some battle-damaged warships, including four escort carriers, a cruiser and a destroyer.

Usually the navy withholds the names of such ships until they are repaired and back with the fleet. But King revealed the names of some of them reporting to Secretary of Navy James Forrestal about naval operations during the past year. He listed:

The escort carriers, Santee, Suwanee, White Plains and Kutkun Bay, all damaged by Japanese gunfire in the battle of Samar last October. This was the engagement in which the escort carriers Gambier Bay and St. Lo, the destroyers Hoel and Johnston and the destroyer escort Roberts were sunk.

The light cruiser Honolulu, seriously damaged by an aerial torpedo off Leyte on Oct. 20 last. The destroyer Ross, damaged by a mine in Leyte gulf on Oct. 19.

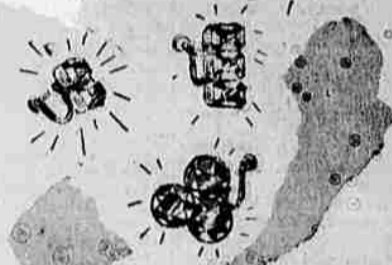
