Processed Foods:
Book 4 — Blue stamps X5 through B2 valid through March 31. Blue stamps C2 through G2 valid through April 28. Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30.

Meat, Butter, Fats, Cheese:
Book 4 — Red stamps Q5 through S5 valid through March 31. Red stamps T5 through X5 valid through April 28. Red stamps Y5 through L2 valid through June 2. Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30.

Sugar:
Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2.

Shoes: Loose stamps invalid.
Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid.

Gasoline: Coupons not valid unless endorsed.
"A" 15 coupons expire June 21.

Stoves:
Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

Delivery by priorities based on needs.

Roger Touhy Again Seeks Freedom

CHICAGO, March 28 (UP)—A 62-page petition for a writ of habeas corpus was filed in federal court today, marking Roger "the Terrible" Touhy's third legal attempt to get out of prison.

Touhy, who led a prison break from the Stateville penitentiary Oct. 9, 1942, charged that he was wrongfully convicted of the kidnapping of John "Jake the Barber" Factor.

OUR MEN IN SERVICE

Bernard Gruis, 2713 Alder street, La Grande, army technician fourth grade, has arrived in the United States on furlough from the European theater of operations where he served 34 months with the field artillery, and is expected to arrive here within the next two weeks.

Gruis, who has been in the armed forces more than three years, saw service in north Africa, Sicily and Italy.

Cash, a machinist's mate, first class, has been stationed at the naval supply depot at Oakland, Calif., and will return there for assignment at the expiration of his furlough. The medal was awarded to Mattoon last fall when his unit of the army air forces was temporarily in combat service in Europe.

Lt. Mattoon also sent his father a ring he obtained from a Polish soldier. It is hand made and bears the great seal of the United States.

Mattoon has been in the service approximately two years, a year of which he has spent overseas.

Prior to entering the army he attended the Eastern Oregon college. He is a graduate of La Grande high school.

Cpl. Harold Borine, who is stationed in France with the army postal service, has been awarded the bronze star medal for the battle of Normandy and the battle of northern France.

Corporal Borine has been overseas a year and in addition to the bronze star he wears the good conduct medal.

Before entering the army in 1943 he was a clerk in the local postoffice. His wife resides in La Grande.

Pvt. Richard W. Young has arrived from Camp Roberts, Calif.
