Civilian Supply Of Pork Boosted; Beef Is Reduced

WASHINGTON, March 31 (UP)—The war food administration yesterday issued two orders changing the amounts of beef and pork federally inspected packers must set aside for government purchase.

The revisions are in line with the recently announced cut in civilian meat allocations for April, May and June, reducing per capita consumption to an approximate average of 115 pounds compared with 126 during the first quarter.

WFA boosted the set-aside on utility beef from 79 to 80 per cent. The government also buys 60 per cent of better grade beef and 89 per cent of canner beef.

Under the revised pork order, civilians will get approximately seven per cent more pork—but entirely of the cheaper cuts. The south will benefit particularly from an increase in salt pork and fat cuts. However, other parts of the country will suffer from a decrease in supplies of ham, bacon, roast and loin.

Net effect of the adjustments will be that 28½ pounds from each 100 pounds of live hog will be set aside for war requirements instead of 30½ pounds.

England Opposes Lublin Pole Seat At Security Table

LONDON, March 31 (UP)—The British government has formally notified Russia that she cannot agree to a Soviet suggestion that the Warsaw Polish government be invited to the San Francisco conference.

The Soviet suggested to Britain and the United States that the Warsaw Poles be asked to the conference if a new provisional government had not been established by that time.

A foreign office spokesman said the Russians have advised the Soviet proposal "is impossible."

He did not know whether the United States and China, to whom the Russians addressed similar notes with a request for a prompt reply, had answered Moscow.

The Soviet request confronted the "big three" with a troublesome new problem even while they were discussing the number of votes each should have at the San Francisco conference.

Both the Polish provisional government, originally set up under Soviet auspices at Lublin, and the rival Polish exile government in London have demanded seats at the conference.

Both the United States and Britain recognize only the London regime, but they have stood by the Yalta decision that only a reconstructed government of national unity drawn from both factions would be invited.

Radio Moscow said the Soviet note contended that the provisional government is entitled to representation at the conference—in the event that the coalition government has not been established—because it is the governing body of the entire Polish territory and has the support of the Polish nation.

The exile government, on the other hand, recognizes that the Red army turned administration of liberated Poland over to the provisional government, but maintains that the London cabinet still has the support of most Poles.

Huge Airport In San Francisco Bay Proposed by Kaiser

NEW YORK, March 31 (UP)—Henry J. Kaiser, west coast industrialist, said today that he had presented to the U. S. army engineering corps a plan for a \$13,800,000 airport to be built on a specially constructed island in San Francisco bay.

He said the planning was done by the Henry J. Kaiser company "on our own initiative . . . and presented to the people of California for their consideration."

His project began with the construction of the 1,100 acre island just off the Berkeley shore of the bay. Dredging operation built up the island with a rock retaining wall. Four 5,700 foot long landing strips, surfaced by heavy concrete paving, were projected upon the arrowhead-shaped airport. Seaplanes would land in the bay.

Five Restaurants To Close Lacking Red Ration Points

Operators of five local restaurants and lunch counters today announced they will close tomorrow, probably to remain inoperative through April, because of a lack of red ration points with which to obtain meat.

Most of the operators said their allotments of blue points for processed foods are adequate.

The businesses affected are the Stockman's Central lunch, Imperial, Corner lunch and Club cafe. Carl Baum, operator of the Stockman's, said the allotment of red points for March and April failed to meet their requirements by 50 percent, leaving them with none for meat for the coming month.

He said the restaurants have experienced substantial increases in business as the meat situation has become tighter, many persons eating one or more meals daily in restaurants to make their family allotments stretch over a longer period.

Stockman said the restaurant owners have been advised by the ration board that there is nothing that can be done about the situation, as the board has no authority to issue ration points for any 60-day period in excess of amount indicated by a restaurant's business during the previous 60 day period.

Local rationing officials suggested that the local eating houses should observe one or more meatless days each week and utilize more meats with lower ration point values.

They said they are unable to issue additional points to any restaurant or lunch counter under conditions such as those that exist here now.

It was explained that when a restaurant's business increases during a two-month period, the restaurant is allowed additional ration points during the ensuing period in proportion to the increase in business.

Local rationing officials suggested that the local eating houses should observe one or more meatless days each week and utilize more meats with lower ration point values.

We have seen how the joy and hosannas of the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem changed so quickly into the scenes of darkness and tragedy, as Jesus was arrested, brought before Pilate, and driven forth to crucifixion. And then, just as quickly, darkness was turned into light, sorrow into joy, and death and tragedy into triumph.

Jesus had warned the disciples in words that after the event seem unmistakably plain that He was about to suffer and die; but the disciples were so filled with the idea of an earthly kingdom, and they were so disputing about who should have the preferred places, almost to the very moment of the crucifixion, that they failed to take His words seriously.

Then came the blow, with the shattering of their hopes. Peter expressed the mood, and the complete disillusionment, when he said, "I go a-fishing," meaning that he was going back to his nets, that the dream for which they had left all and followed Jesus was over.

But in that very hour of dark despair came the joyous news of the empty tomb and the risen Christ. Hope and faith revived, and the twelve whom Jesus had chosen, now eleven with the betrayal of Judas, went forth to their task of world conquest, reinforced soon by the converted Paul, whose motivating conviction, filled with power, was that he too had seen the master "as one born out of due season."

The resurrection became the groundwork of Paul's faith and work, as it was that of the first disciples. It is the profound conviction that has been the motivating power of Christianity—the faith that Jesus lives, and that He is leading on.

Is it hard to believe? Consider the miracle of Christianity itself. What less than that conviction that Jesus had risen and had revealed Himself to them could have arrested the disciples in their hour of complete despair and sent them forth in a new found faith, prepared to serve, to suffer, and if need be to die, for the glory of spiritually carrying on the work and ministry of a king, who but yesterday was the center of their ambition for earthly power and reward?

Their faith, like their works, was the evidence of the transformation through which they passed as they knew that Jesus lived, and they understood the words concerning His death and resurrection that but a few weeks before had seemed so incomprehensible.

Would God that we, also, might have that experience, and know the risen Christ as they knew Him, and find the power that these humble men found through the resurrection! That would be for us a joyous Easter.
