Give Eyes Rest; It's Appreciated

Stop after an hour of fine eye-work, close your lids, then stare out into the distance. After one and one-half hours of close seeing, give your eyes a real rest, and they'll do the tasks you impose with less strain.

To keep the mist of fatigue out of your eyes, work by a good light. Light is good, usually, if there is enough of it. Best kind of artificial light is a combination of the direct and the indirect. The direct light should be focused on the object you're working on; the indirect should diffuse rays around you.

Worst lighting to work by is the spotty kind where rays concentrate here, shadows gang up there. To accommodate first light, and then shadows, eye muscles must, of necessity, become shifters, and they'll punish you for the extra strain to which you put them.

Woman's Place In World Peace Plan Is Speaker's Topic

Mrs. Saidie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, spoke at yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Neighborhood club on demobilization.

She said women need to realize the necessity of sacrifice for peace, if world peace is to be obtained, and cited the women of England as an example.

Dealing with the post-war period, Mrs. Dunbar spoke of the changes that necessarily must occur in production, transportation and commerce and the possible influence it will have on our social program.

She said women in industry will play a large part in the planning for the future, and emphasized that it is every woman's duty to be well informed on world affairs so she will be able to intelligently assist in solving problems which will arise.

Mrs. Dunbar was national president of the Federated Women's clubs in 1938-1941, was a member of the good-will tour to South America in 1941, and at the present time is a member of the advisory committee to the manpower commission which meets monthly in Washington, D. C.
